ELECTION RESULTS DEMOCRATS CONTROL HOUSE HOOVER REALLY MAD WANTS A SHOW-DOWN APPOINTS COMMITTEE MUCH NAVY DEBATE

Naturally, one does not expect Democratic and Republican spokesmen to agree in interpreting the election results last week. Whereas J. Edgar Hoover points to the Republican district lost in Michigan as an indication of the voters' repudiation of the present Administration, Senator Fess points to the result in the first Ohio district, (Nicholas Longworth's old stamping ground), as an indication of an approval of the President.

Nevertheless, the Democratic gain of last November was somewhat enhanced by the recent election, which, apparently, will give that party control of the House and elevate Representative Garner of Texas, to the speakership. Garner is a veteran about to begin his fifteenth term. He has been one of the most colorful members, exhibiting independence as well as vehemence. His friendship with Longworth was proverbial and, while the two leaders fought each other in political matters, they respected each other. Barring unforeseen accidents, Garner's election will give the Democrats control of important committees in the House.

In New York the voters gave a sweeping majority to Governor Roosevelt in his fight for a re-election amendment, which was vigorously opposed by Al Smith. In New Jersey, Democrat Harry Moore went into office on a landslide over his Republican opponent.

The five congressional contests were staged in Michigan, New York, Pennsylvania, and two in Ohio. The Republicans won in Pennsylvania and in one Ohio district. The Democrats were victors in New York, Ohio, and upset their opponents in the Michigan district for the first time since 1898. It is noted that each of the new congressmen—three Democrats and two Republicans—classified either as "Repealists" or "Modificationists" of the prohibition laws. Incidentally, it should be noted that the Wet bloc in the House has grown to about 150 members out of a total membership of around 435 members.

President Hoover, riled over statements made by William H. Gardner, President of the Navy League, questioned the accuracy of the statements made by Mr. Gardner and insisted upon appointing a committee of five, three of whom are members of the Navy League, to pass judgment on the controversy created. The spectacle is somewhat unusual.

The Navy League is an organization designed to promote the progress and efficiency of the Navy of the United States by giving publicity to what it considers "accurate" information as to naval matters. The League issues statements to the press and one of its own officials says that copies of such statements are mailed to the White House.

What aroused the President's ire was a statement by the League criticizing efforts "to reduce and to starve the Navy under a plea of budget limitations." Besides, it was contended in the statement that the President had yielded to British ends in regards to the cruiser question and to the Japanese on the submarine question, the auxiliary ratio and in not fortifying naval bases in the Far East.

Moreover, there are hints of secrets in the Hoover-MacDonald conference and the charge that "the Administration refused to allow even an executive session of the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations to see the full record of its negotiations." There was also the statement that "humanitarian and pacifist intentions had led President Hoover into an exhibition of abysmal ignorance of why navies are maintained" and the declaration that his proposal "to immunize sea-borne food supplies" would have made for "bigger and bloodier wars."

The Navy League statement was immediately assailed by the President, who announced an inquiry to demonstrate "the untruths and distortions of facts." The President's intention to appoint a commission was countered by President

Pacific Greyhound Line Announce Rerouting of Busses over Canyon Road

Announcement is made by E. A. Hadfield, Assistant General Manager of the Pacific Greyhound Lines, that effective on and after Thursday, November 19, the Portland-Beaverton-Forest Grove service will be operated over the Canyon Road cut-off instead of via Fairvale.

The Garden Home Busses will at the same time take over the operations between Portland-Fairvale-Lake Road and intermediate points and will honor all outstanding tickets of the Pacific Greyhound Lines between these points. The Garden Home Busses will operate from the Union Pacific Depot at Park and Taylor streets.

No change will be made in the times of departure from Portland or Forest Grove of the present Pacific Greyhound service, but schedules will arrive 9 minutes earlier in Portland than at present and approximately seven minutes in time will be saved westbound by the shorter route.

Preliminary Arrangements Completed for Sherwood Potato Show Next Week

Potatoes, onions, corn, squash, pumpkins and general farm exhibits have all been provided for by the management of the Sherwood Potato show November 20 and 21. E. D. Hosmer and his committee with W. F. Cyrus, county agent, have just completed the preliminary arrangements. Commercial Burbanks, Netted Gems, miscellaneous varieties, certified Burbanks, Gems and other varieties have been provided for. There is also a class for 4x4 club members, and a special class for exhibitors who have never won a prize on potatoes. The best 12 hills of potatoes will receive a premium. Entries in this class will be dug by the show committee. Growers of yellow, white and red dent field corn will all have an opportunity to win the ribbons in their respective classes. The Citizens Bank of Sherwood has contributed the cash prizes for the best farm display. Canned goods will not be considered a part of such exhibits. All entries are expected to be in place by noon of Friday, November 20.

Potato grading will be the important feature at the meeting of potato growers scheduled for the afternoon of Saturday during the show. E. R. Jackman, of the State college extension service, will be present to discuss grades and gradings. Henry Taube, potato inspector, will also be there to take part in the meeting. Results will be presented from some field trials conducted the past season in which several lots of seed were grown that had been stored under widely different conditions.

CITY TO ADD 2 MORE COUNCILMEN AT GENERAL ELECTION

Fred Paulus, deputy state treasurer, was present at the Council meeting, November 5th, in behalf of the financial condition of the town. Following discussion on the matter Councilman Talbert made a motion that the city attorney be directed to prepare an amendment authorizing the city council to issue refunding bonds to refund improvement bonds outstanding, to the extent that the sinking funds are not available.

The council met again Monday, at which time S. Hawes appeared in regards to the hauling of garbage and cleaning streets. An agreement was made to confer with Mr. Hawes as soon as a lease is signed for the garbage dump, for further arrangements to do this work.

Reference to the state law and city charter confirmed the desire of the council to increase their councilmen to six in place of the present number of four. Due to this fact voters will at the next election December 8th select four councilmen, three to serve for a period of three years and one for a year, to conform with the written law.

The board serving for the special election were again nominated for the general election.

Those on the board are C. E. Heide, chairman, L. Underhill, Anna Hyland, Mrs. W. H. Boswell and Mrs. Mabel Alexander.

A resolution submitting a proposed charter amendment to the legal voters of the town of Beaverton, authorizing the refunding of local improvement bonds was read in full and passed readings by title only together with the final reading by title only. The resolution was then adopted and carried.

The council refused to pay a bill rendered by Joe Miller in payment of the tile laid on First street, however they allowed Mr. Miller a small discount on the tile laid in front of his property.

Recorder Richey was instructed to send a letter to the O. E. R. R. requesting them to cover the ditch at the crossing on Hamilton street as well as repair the crossing at Lombard street. Pavement at this point is unfinished due to the conditions existing at the O. E. tracks. Immediate action of the railroad company is asked.

Beaverton Boy Included First Year in Honor List at Oregon State College
