H. Bartlett, former Republican governor, by a decisive majority in a congressional district normally Republican. In 1930, the Republican candidate carried the district by a majority of 8,000. This victory gives the Democrats 220 seats in the House, a lead of six over the Republicans.

After urging that the Democratic party adopt a "home rule" plank on the Prohibition question, and disclosing that an overwhelming sentiment against Prohibition was evident from his poll, Chairman Raskob, prior to the Democratic National Committee meeting announced he was against a platform declaration that "in the slightest degree" commits the Democratic party "to a Wet or Dry side." At the same time, he insisted that the adoption of a "home rule" policy would be necessary to prevent a definite split between the Democratic party of the North and of the South.

He says his plan would not bind Democrats in Congress to do anything but vote for its submission to the people.

Described by Admiral William V. Pratt, Chief of Naval Operations, as the "easiest naval bill" ever presented to Congress, and with the strong endorsement of Secretary of the Navy Adams, who declared that it did not violate any Hoover administration commitments, the Vinson \$616,000,000 naval replacement bill calls for a ten-year program to build the navy up to the London Treaty limitations. Mr. Vinson, new Democratic chairman of the Naval Committee, in a bill of not more than five hundred words, covered every angle of a program involving 120 ships. Mr. Britten, former chairman, wanted a one-year program, but the Vinson plan seems to meet the views of Admiral Pratt "from a military point of view," as outlined some weeks ago in his statement urging a systematic policy of gradual replacement.
