To the President and members of the Beaverton Relief Committee: We, your committee on Christmas baskets submit the following report: On December 15, through the kindness of Mr. Metzler, an appeal was made to the students of the Beaverton High School and the response was a regular avalanche of food stuffs including fruits and vegetables, canned fruit labeled for size and sex, also toys.

These young people certainly put this project over the top with flying colors and if it were possible, we, the committee would be proud to take each one by the hand and say "Thank you." The Rebekah and Odd Fellow lodges forged the usual gifts at their annual Christmas tree party and turned over the sum of \$15.30.

The merchants of the city donated candy the Elwanis 100 pound sack of walnuts, Frances Livermore Jr., box of apples; Mr. Berthold 8 sacks of flour; Mrs. Ruby T. Boyd 1 box of Jap oranges; C. J. Beach, 1 sack of dried oranges; Otto Erickson sack of dried prunes.

On the 21st of December the committee assisted by Mrs. Wm. Engleke met at the relief store room and packed 25 baskets containing food, clothing, toys and candy. We estimate that 42 adults and 50 children, a total of 92 were given Christmas cheer. The baskets were delivered to the homes the same day by Chester Beach assisted by Raymond Harrison.

Through the kindness of Mr. Manning we were able to purchase pork for 9c per pound.

The morning of the 23rd Dewey Drorbaugh assisted by Mr. Beach delivered 132 pounds of pork roasts to the same families and on the evening of the 23rd Mr. Short delivered 12 quarts of milk donated by E. R. Johnson. LAUNCH CAMPAIGN TO ELIMINATE DAIRY SUB- STITUTES FROM COUNTY

Washington County Herds 14,000 Dairy Cows, 2000 More than any Other

Dairymen of Washington County are being supported practically 100 per cent by merchants in their campaign to eliminate dairy substitutes from this county.

More than 110 grocers, cooperating with the Dairy committee, have signed a pledge to not sell Oleomargarine or other dairy substitutes, while only two small groceries and one sandwich counter have refused to support Washington County dairy industry.

This county has slightly over 14,000 dairy cows or 200 more than any other county in the state, according to the latest available census which indicates the importance of the dairy industry to merchants and residents.

Dairy substitutes, manufactured largely of imported products, are direct competitors of this important industry, and while jams, jellies, etc., are sometimes referred to as butter substitutes, the dairymen are not in the least opposed to these for the reason that they are manufactured from farm products grown in this state and nation.

Dairying has always been a fundamental industry of the Anglo-Saxon people and history has proven that in states and communities where dairying has prospered other farm enterprises have prospered.

Over long periods of time the sale of dairy products has been about the most stable and dependable of any farm product which helps to make the industry a desirable one for any community.

When food value is taken into consideration all available facts prove the superiority of dairy products. Doctors the world over recommend dairy products as a partial remedy for cases of malnutrition.

Members of the Dairymen's committee are very appreciative of the loyal and whole hearted support accorded them by food dealers of their county.
