NEW PASTOR CALLED TO FILL PULPIT OF NAZARENE CHURCH

Rev. Ava S. Adams of Seattle, has arrived in Beaverton to take the pastorate of the Nazarene church, and will fill the pulpit next Sunday.

Miss Adams was born in northern Arkansas and spent her early years on a large farm in that country. At the age of sixteen she came west with her parents and graduated from Foster high school, near Seattle. She then attended the Nazarene University at Pasadena, California, and in addition to this during her first pastorate completed a four-year theological course by correspondence.

Miss Adams is an ordained minister in the Church of the Nazarene and has spent nine years in the ministry of her denomination, six of these having been spent in the pastorate and three in the evangelistic field, the latter taking her into California, Oregon, Washington, British Columbia, and Idaho.

At present, in addition to her pastoral duties, she is one of the secretaries and a member of the executive committee of the Women's Foreign Missionary society, also a member of the District Home Missionary Board.

Miss Adams comes to Beaverton from Eugene where she has just closed a very successful pastorate and announces that she is here to serve the community to the best of her ability.

REFUNDING BONDS HOLD NO INTEREST AT SPECIAL MEETING

No bids were received at the special meeting this week of the city council for the issue of \$10,000 refunding bonds. The meeting was an advertised affair for the sole purpose of disposing of these bonds.

A motion was made to consult Teak, Winfree, McCulloch and Schuyler, bond attorneys, as to the validity of the recent refunding bonds voted.

The problem of a garbage dump, has developed into a suggestion by Mayor Wilson that the city of Beaverton purchase a tract of land from 1 to 5 acres suitable for such a purpose. A committee composed of Councilmen Marsh, Barnes and Desinger is expected to investigate the matter and report at the regular meeting of the council February 1.

Mr. Short, represented the West Coast Telephone company in the matter of a free phone for the town marshal. Councilmen Boswell Alexander and Fordney were appointed to confer further on the matter with Mr. Short.

Lewis Smith explained to the council that the maps on file in recorder's office of the water system, are inadequate and stated he was of the opinion that a complete new set, showing valves, hydrants, new mains, etc., would be a profitable investment for the city.

Mr. Davis of the National Aircraft Corp., again appeared before the council, regarding the removal of the P. E. P. high tension wires near the airport. The recorder was instructed to send a letter to the company, warning them to comply with the agreements of their franchise. Otherwise the city will take steps to have the wires removed and charge the expense to the P. E. P. Co.

Accident insurance for volunteer firemen, was brought up by Francis Livermore and he was asked to investigate rates.

Regulations for the operation of wholesale trade vehicles in the town of Beaverton, was reported by Councilman Marsh. Much discussion followed the reading of an ordinance covering such a matter in Forest Grove. Attorney Meyer was instructed to draw an ordinance.

The P. T. A. are urging the council to create a curfew ordinance and its enforcement.

A bill of \$10 presented by C. E. Hedge for the use of his adding machine for the past two years, was ordered paid and Councilman Barnes given authority to purchase a machine for the recorders office.

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A BRIEF STATEMENT OF PERTINENT FACTS ABOUT J. O. BAILEY

J. O. Bailey has expressed his intention of becoming a candidate for Judge for the Supreme Court of the State of Oregon, position number 3 in the primaries to be held on May 20, 1932.

Mr. Bailey was born on a farm near Grinnell, Iowa, 51 years ago, the son of John Sherbourne Bailey, and Harriet Kingsley Bailey, natives of Vermont. Received elementary education in country and village schools. Entered Penn College Academy at Oskaloosa, Iowa, in 1896 and was transferred to Iowa (now Grinnell) College preparatory school in 1899. Spent eighteen months during 1900 and 1901 traveling in Belgium, Switzerland, Italy and Austria, and studying and traveling in France and Germany.

Entered Harvard College in 1902 as a freshman, graduating with an A. B. degree in 1905. Toured England, Wales and Scotland by automobile during summer of 1905. Received law education at Harvard Law School and in the law offices of Schenk & Berryhill at Des Moines, Iowa, and Merrill, Oswald & Merrill at Spokane, Washington. Admitted to practice in State of Washington in fall of 1907 and practiced at Spokane until July 1910. Came to Oregon in July 1910, and was associated with the law firm of Platt & Platt of Portland, from the latter part of 1910 until May, 1915.

Became assistant attorney general of Oregon in May 1915, and resigned in October 1920, since which time has been engaged in the practice of law at Portland, Oregon, as a member of the law firm of Perkins & Bailey Elected state representative from Multnomah County in 1924 and re-elected in 1926. Elected State Senator from Multnomah County in 1928. Served as director of the Portland Public Schools from 1927 to 1930.

Married in Portland, Ore., in 1911 to Verna A. Chase. They have four children, Frances, a sophomore at Oregon State College; Jason, a senior at Jefferson High School, will enter the University of Oregon next year; Robert, a freshman at Jefferson High School; and Barbara five years old.

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
