transactions and dealings rather than a hindrance; and that petitions for a re-hearing should be given careful consideration by all judges who participated in the original decision. Following are important features of the new Non-Partisan Judiciary Law: Candidates for judges of the Supreme Circuit and District Courts are nominated and elected without reference to political parties or party affiliations.

At both the primary and general elections there is a separate ballot, designated "Judiciary Ballot", on which appear only the names of the persons who are candidates for judicial offices, without reference to political parties or party affiliations.

If not to exceed two persons file as candidates for any one vacancy, department or position, "the name of such persons shall not be placed upon the primary ballot but such person or persons shall be the nominee or nominees for such office." If more than two persons file as candidates for any one vacancy, department or position, between candidates receiving the highest number of votes for said vacancy, department or position, become the nominees for such office, unless one of the candidates receives a majority of all votes cast for such office, in which case his name appears as the only nominee for such office on the separate "Judiciary Ballot" at the general election, with one space "left following such name in which the voter may insert the name of any person for whom he wishes to cast his ballot".

The positions of the members of the Supreme Court are designated by numbers from 1 to 7 inclusive, and candidates for the Supreme

Court must in their petitions, designate the position they seek. At the coming election there are two vacancies in the Supreme Court to be filled,—positions numbered 2 and 3. No slogan or other identification appears on the ballot after the names of candidates for judicial offices, therefore, in the future, "By their works (not words) ye shall know them."

GRADE SCHOOL NEWS

This week marks the beginning of the second term of the year's work. Each half year the average of each pupil's grades are recorded on a card file for this purpose. The melting didn't spoil the fun entirely, though for it furnished the motivation for much hand work among the younger people—especially in the second

grade room where the pupils cut paper flakes after the patterns found outside and in the third where snow posters were enthusiastically produced. Following the snow the robins have fascinated everybody from the youngest pupil to the teachers and janitors. Hosts of them accompanied by many sparrows and a few juncos have clustered about the building picking up crumbs and feasting on apple cores scattered by the pupils.
