PHAR LAP ARRIVES SHARKEY AND SCHMELING OUGHT TO DRAW THE OLYMPIC GAMES ODDS AND ENDS

Phar Lap, Australia's thoroughbred, will race in the \$10,000 special at Agua Caliente, on the 21st. The Australian horse has won 36 of 50 starts and \$282,200.00 and is said to be after Sun Beau's record of \$376,744. Good opposition is assured the Australian champion in his North American debut and in the other races that he will run in this country.

Whether the newcomer will be able to do better than other foreign invaders remains to be seen. In his own country he is considered the greatest weight-carrier in years and in the Melbourne Cup race last year, Phar Lap carried 150 pounds and drew the extreme outside position. If fully acclimated, he ought to be able to win his first start.

The Sharkey-Schmeling championship bout in June ought to be a success if the customers have the money. Sharkey, it seems, is entitled to a shot at the Teuton who won the title on June 12, 1930, because the Boston Gob, after bewildering him with fair punches, struck a low blow in the fourth round. Lincoln Forbears Not Men of Mean Stock

His Ancestor a Member of Jefferson's Cabinet.

ABRAHAM LINCOLN came of no mean stock, according to Dr. Louis A. Warren, of Fort Wayne, Ind., director of the Lincoln Historical Research foundation and editor of Lincoln Lore.

The Civil War President's family belonged to the ante-bellum southern aristocracy of Kentucky, and one of his ancestors was a cabinet officer in a Democratic administration, Doctor Warren's research has revealed.

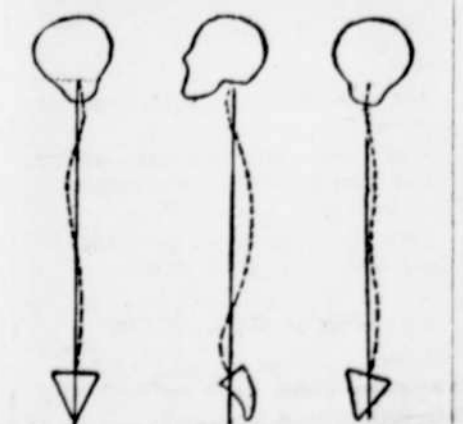
In refuting the popular misconception that Lincoln rose from poverty and was of an humble origin, Doctor Warren declared that if his revelations were a shock to cherished ideas of the emancipator, they had the sound backing of documentary evidence.

"President Lincoln was of the seventh generation of his family in America, and his line has been traced back through four generations in Hingham, England. Samuel Lincoln, who came to America in 1637 and founded the town of Hingham, Mass., was the founder of the American line. "When Lincoln visited Worcester, Mass., in 1848, and was entertained by Levi Lincoln, he was the guest of one of his own family, although neither he nor his host knew of the connection. The President died without knowing of the link with the Lincolns who had a prominent part in molding the history of New England. A recent document lists more than 1,000 of them. Levi, Sr., who was once governor of the Bay state, was secretary of state under Thomas Jefferson."

Doctor Warren traced the migration of the Lincolns from Massachusetts, through New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Kentucky, across the Ohio river into Indiana and thence to Illinois.

"Lincoln's grandfather, once holder of 5,000 acres of land in Kentucky, was massacred by the Indians in one of the great tragedies of the family. Following his death, when Lincoln's father, Thomas, was ten years old, the widow was defrauded out of practically all of the land, which may explain the beginnings of the humble origin theory."

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WE SERVE, REGARDLESS OF THE TIME DAY OR NIGHT

Thrift Dinners Are Economical; They Save Both Time and Money

BUSY Winter days often leave little time for preparation of elaborate dinners, and at such times we are especially thankful for the wealth of prepared and semi-prepared foods that enable us to serve delicious dinners at low cost and with little effort. The menu suggested below is a thrifty one, prepared in a very short time. The Spaghetti is perfectly seasoned, prepared ready to heat and serve; the tiny sausage cakes cook quickly; the vegetable may come from the supply shelf; the salad requires but a few minutes; and the dessert is the nicest surprise of all in this quick-time meal. Refrigerator Gingerbread may be mixed on Monday and kept covered in the refrigerator all week, or longer, ready to pour into the pan and bake when you wish to serve it fresh and hot. The topping to be served on it is a quick one, too.

Cooked Spaghetti in Tomato Sauce with Small Sausage Cakes*
Buttered Green Beans or Spinach
Pineapple and Sliced Grape Salad* French Dressing
Whole Wheat Bread Butter
Refrigerator Gingerbread* with Apple Butter Topping*
Coffee

Cooked Spaghetti in Tomato Sauce with Small Sausage Cakes—1 medium can Cooked Spaghetti in Tomato Sauce; 1 pound sausage. Form sausage into small cakes and brown slowly. Remove from frying pan and pour off all but one tablespoonful fat from pan. Place cooked Spaghetti in pan and allow to heat thoroughly. Heap Spaghetti in center of hot platter, surround with sausage cakes, garnish with sprigs of parsley or slices of pickle and serve.

Pineapple and Sliced Grape Salad—6 slices pineapple; 1 pound Malaga grapes; 1 small head lettuce. In nests of crisp lettuce place pineapple rings. On each place a mound of grapes that have been cut in half and seeded. Serve with French Dressing. (Skins may be cut from grapes, if desired.)

Refrigerator Gingerbread with

Apple Butter Topping—½ cup granulated sugar; ¼ cup butter; ¼ cup vegetable shortening; 1 egg; ½ cup baking molasses; 2 cups flour; ½ teaspoon ginger; 1 teaspoon cinnamon; ½ teaspoon allspice; ½ teaspoon salt; 1 teaspoon baking soda in ½ cup hot water. Combine ingredients in the order given and bake in a greased square or oblong pan from 35 to 40 minutes in a moderate oven (about 350° F.). (Latter may be mixed and kept in the refrigerator for a week or more before baking.) Serve gingerbread warm with Apple Butter Topping.

Apple Butter Topping—Beat until stiff 1 egg white, to which a few grains of salt have been added. Fold in 4 tablespoons Pure Apple Butter, adding 1 tablespoon at a time and beating after the addition of each tablespoon. A few drops of lemon juice may be added, if desired.
