

ORDINANCE NO. 132

An Ordinance prescribing rules and regulations for the operation of Wholesale Trade Vehicles in the Town of Beaverton, Washington County, Oregon, providing for the issue of licenses therefor, fixing the amount of license fees and the time of payment thereof, defining terms used herein prescribing penalties for violations of this ordinance and fixing the time when this ordinance shall go into effect....

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF BEAVERTON AS FOLLOWS.

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate a Wholesale Trade Vehicle on any street in the Town of Beaverton, Oregon, without first having obtained a license therefor as in hereinafter provided.

Section 2. Each and every Wholesale Trade Vehicle shall be operated by a person at least 16 years of age, and who, at the time of operating the same, if it be a motor vehicle, shall be registered and licensed to operate motor vehicles in Oregon, as provided by the Oregon Motor Vehicle Law, and each and every such Wholesale Trade Vehicle and operator thereof shall at all times be subject to and under the strict regulations of all ordinances of the Town of Beaverton, Oregon, and all State regulations and laws relative to the operation of motor vehicles, and by the laws of the road now in effect or which may hereafter be enacted.

Section 3. Any person who shall desire to operate a Wholesale Trade Vehicle upon any street in the said Town of Beaverton, Oregon, shall make application, in writing, to the Recorder of said Town, which application shall set forth with reasonable certainty, the following:

1. The name and place of location of the business of applicant.
2. If a motor vehicle, name of manufacturer, model, and rated capacity of vehicle proposed to be licensed.

3. The kind, or kinds, of goods, wares or merchandise, proposed to be sold or delivered from such vehicle.

Section 4. The license fee required by this ordinance shall be 6.25 per quarter year, or fraction thereof, payable in advance, January 1st, April 1st, July 1st, and October 1st of each year, and no payments shall be accepted for less than one quarter year.

Section 5. No person operating any Wholesale Trade Vehicle shall deposit or leave upon the streets any garbage, vegetable refuse, or matter or anything of an offensive dangerous or unsanitary character.

Section 6. Any person who violates any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine not exceeding \$200.00 for each offense, or by imprisonment for a period not exceeding 30 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment; provided, that each and every day any violation of this ordinance continues shall be deemed a separate offense under this ordinance.

Section 7. Unless it appears from the context that a different meaning is intended, the following words used in this ordinance shall have the meanings attached to them by this section.

The word "Street" shall mean and include any street, alley, avenue, highway, court, lane, or public place in the town of Beaverton.

The terms "Wholesale Trade Vehicle" shall mean and include any traveling conveyance propelled driven or drawn by any motive power whatever, including horses or other animals, and operated for the purpose of selling or delivering goods, wares, or merchandise, to any person in the Town of Beaverton.

tion, Oregon, engaged in re-sell the same. Provided, that the definition of Wholesale Trade Vehicle, herein contained, shall not be construed to include any vehicle so operated for the purpose of selling or delivering any article of food in its raw state or condition and which was actually grown or produced by the operator thereof or some member of his family.

The word "Person" shall mean and include persons, co-partners, associations, corporations, their agents, lessees, trustees, or receivers, (appointed by any Court whatsoever), either as principal, agent, or employee, and the regular number shall include the plural.

Section 8. The provisions of this ordinance shall go into effect on the 1st day of April, 1932.
