THE HOUSE REVOLTS

The House coalition against the proposed tax bill, with its sales features, routed the leaders in several sessions of Congress, and finally the revolt reached such proportions that adjournment was taken because the body was not "in a proper frame of mind to legislate". Leaders of the proponents of the measure were unable for several days to make any headway against the revolt, who rejected offers of compromise and seemed to be in the saddle.

After several days spent in vain efforts to placate the sales tax opponents the matter came to a vote in the House and the sales tax was beaten, 223 to 153. Democratic leaders Rainey and Bryns were on opposite sides, the former for the tax and the latter against it. Republican leaders held for the tax, without which many claim the budget cannot be balanced. The result of the vote in the House is to give that body a new task in the search for sources of revenue and the probability looms that special taxes will be considered. It may mean that there will be increased taxes on tobacco, automobiles, gasoline, radios, electricity, gas and higher postage rates.

The probability of a dry law test vote in the Senate looms as a certainty in April. Twenty-four senators, thirteen of whom are Republicans, have signed a petition asking for an opportunity to vote on the question of modification or repeal of the Eighteenth amendment. Fourteen other senators are said to favor the move. The understanding is that Dry senators will not strenuously fight the test.

Considerable difference of opinion is seen in regards to the full payment of the World War adjusted compensation certificates. Some congressmen insist that it will be overwhelmingly approved at this session, with more than enough votes to override a presidential veto. Others are not so sure, and insist that if the attempt is made to pay the certificates in full, President Hoover will veto the bill and, as Rep. Rainey, the Democratic floor leader says, become a "national hero."

Evidence that Congress is seriously attempting the balancing of the budget is seen in the work of the special economy subcommittee, which is even now considering cuts in federal salaries, which, it is said, will save between \$50,000,000 and \$100,000,000. In the Senate one sees evidence of a determination to reduce all appropriations bills by an even ten per cent slash.

An interesting report, asking that four per cent beer be legalized, comes from a sub-committee of the Senate, where two senators happened to be a majority and were able to write the report to their nation. While some newspapers gave great prominence to the report, it is not at all certain that the measure deserves the spotlight at this time, although it may be brought up and become a test of Senate sentiment.

Among the arguments in favor of the bill, according to its supporters, is that it will bring in from \$347,000,000 to \$800,000,000 in taxes, employ from 500,000 to 1,000,000 workers, revive hotel business and give profits to more than 100,000 farmers who would raise barley to be consumed each year. Of course, these arguments are each and every one denied by opponents of the measure, who contend that facts are to the contrary.

After a conference with railway leaders, President Hoover reports that the carriers' financial necessities are less than at first thought and that the Reconstruction Finance Corporation will not be required to furnish as much money as originally
