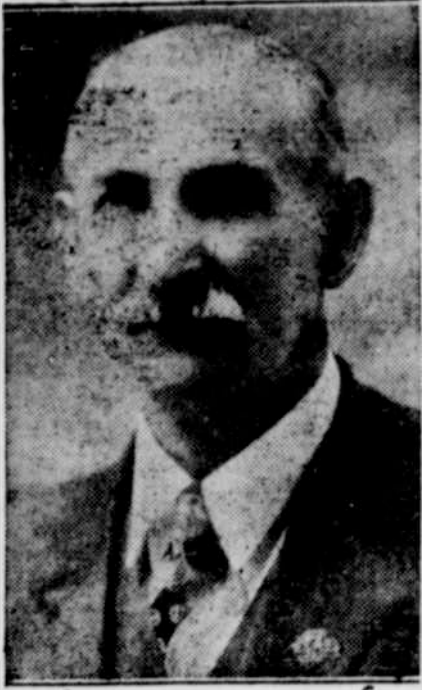

J. T. Hadley had the misfortune to cut off a piece of his right hand on his birthday March 25. That's a new way to celebrate ones birthday.

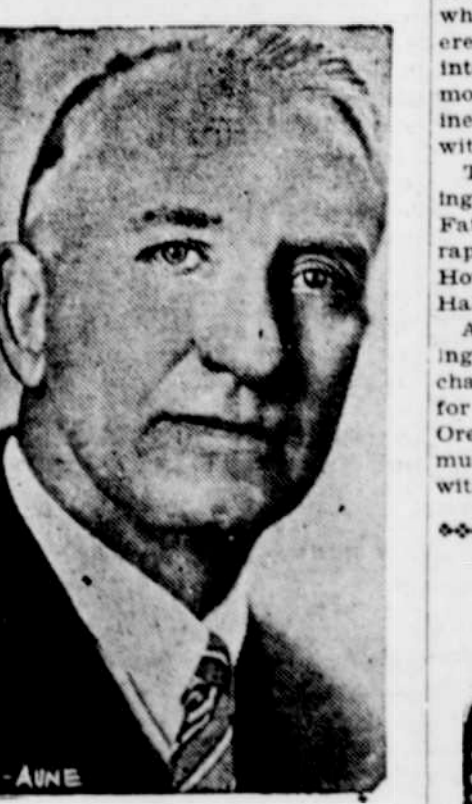

Community Mass Meeting Monday at Church of Christ

The story of a boy who followed in his "dad's footsteps" and of a father who awakened almost too late will be vividly portrayed in the drama "Charged With Manslaughter" which will be presented at a community mass meeting in the Church of Christ, Beaverton, on Monday evening, April 11 at 7:45 o'clock.

The scene is laid in the County Attorney's office just after an automobile crash. The father, a prominent business man, is reaping what he has sown. He has liquor in his home, he scoffs at prohibition, he sows the seeds of lawlessness in the mind of his boy, who obtains liquor from his father's bootlegger, and while intoxicated drives a high powered car, forcing another automobile into the ditch, seriously injuring the mother and her child. And now, the inevitable result, his son charged with manslaughter.

The cast is as follows: Prosecuting attorney, Rev. R. E. Close; the Father, W. M. Heacock; the stenographer, Miss Ruth Martin; the Son, Howard Petzold; the Sheriff, Earl Hall.

All are invited to attend the meeting. There will be no admission charge. An offering will be taken for the promotion of prohibition in Oregon. Children are welcome but must be accompanied by and sit with their parents.

Colonel Alfred E. Clark Files as Candidate for United States Senator

On Monday of this week Colonel Alfred E. Clark filed with the Secretary of State, at Salem, a declaration of intention to become a candidate on the Republican ticket for United States senator, his name to appear on the ballot at the primaries on May 20. This action removes all uncertainty as to the intentions of Colonel Clark, in a political way and places before the people of the state for consideration for that high office, the name of one of Oregon's outstanding attorneys and one who for many years has been conspicuously active in public service.

With the filing of the declaration, Colonel Clark released a brief outline of the policies he advocates and which will be elaborated upon in his formal platform which he will issue shortly and which he will discuss in his state-wide campaign which he says he will enter upon, vigorously, at once. Matters that he considers important are: Unemployment relief, development of the Columbia river, reduction of taxes, aid to agriculture, and other industries, particularly lumber, return of federal lands to state, farm board efficiency and economy, effective federal regulation of public utilities, generous treatment of ex-service men and their dependents, old age pensions, vigorous enforcement of criminal laws.

While Colonel Clark has been active in state and municipal affairs since 1911 when he served as chairman of the Portland charter commission, it was during the World War that he gained national fame.

In 1917 he volunteered his services and sought active field duty. In August of that year he was commissioned major and assigned for duty in the national capital as assistant advocate general of the army. Here he figured in one of the dramatic episodes of the war. Four young men had been sentenced to death for military offenses which action Colonel Clark was called upon to review. He took the stand that death sentences for such offenses should not be imposed upon boys and young men just out of private life and thrust into the army. He waged a strong fight to have these sentences set aside and he won. The result was no American soldier was executed for a purely military offense during the war.

Veteran publications contain many accounts of controversies in which Colonel Clark engaged where he made vigorous attacks on court martial proceedings and arbitrary actions in which death sentences were imposed on enlisted men.

On August 17, 1919, he retired

from the army with the rank of colonel and was appointed representative of the war department to sit with members of the imperial munitions board to adjust war claims amounting to millions of dollars between Canada and the United States.

Sam'l. B. Lawrence Believes in Conserving Expenses

Greyhound Lines Sponsor Programs Over 49 Stations

The Pacific Coast as a travel and vacation attraction will be featured in a nationwide radio program starting April 3 and sponsored by Greyhound Lines, it was learned today.

Twelve of these stations are on the Pacific Coast, KERN Bakersfield; KJM Fresno; KHL Los Angeles; KOIN Portland; KFBK Sacramento; KIDL Salt Lake City; KGE San Diego; KFRG San Francisco; KDB Santa Barbara; KOL Seattle; KFFY Spokane; and KWG Stockton.

Programs will originate in the Chicago studios of the Columbia systems and will reach the Pacific Coast points between 8:15 and 8:30 p. m., Pacific Standard Time.

A feature of these radio programs will be a travel contest with free transportation by bus to any point in the United States on Greyhound Lines and money sufficient for living expenses while making the trip, Markel said. "Details of the contest will be given in the radio programs.
