OTHER FEES, COSTS AND EXPENSES—THE TRUTH ABOUT DELINQUENT TAXES

Under date of May 24, 1930, the County Court by letter directed the Sheriff and myself to proceed with the collection of delinquent taxes. At this time it was estimated that the cost of foreclosure would be anywhere from \$10,000 to \$12,000 and there was no money in the Treasury which could be lawfully used for this purpose, hence an item of \$10,000 was placed in the budget and brought up at the budget meeting in the latter part of 1930. At the budget meeting I expressed the opinion that in these times of financial depression and disaster and unemployment that the County would receive more money from its delinquent taxes by allowing all delinquent taxes to be paid in full with interest at 6% and that the County Court had authority to follow this procedure. The item nevertheless was placed in the budget and the money so budgeted was collected during the tax collecting period of 1931. Under date of May 21, 1931, the present County Court by letter directed me to proceed with the foreclosure of delinquent taxes. In the meantime the legislature had met, had passed some tax law and it was agreed between the County Court and myself that it would be better to wait until after the laws of that session had been printed and circulated in order that we might proceed in accordance therewith. In the meantime a case had been argued in the Supreme Court contesting the levy of certain taxes. If the contentions of that taxpayer were sustained it would no doubt have nullified a large number of the delinquent taxes in Washington County and if we proceeded and the holding in the Supreme Court be adverse, it would mean that we would have expended a large amount of money uselessly and wastefully in our procedure. The matter was taken up verbally and by written communications with the County Court and it was thought best by the County Court and myself to delay the institution of the foreclosure until after this decision was rendered. Immediately after the decision was rendered, on the 6th day of October 1931, we went to work to prepare the tax foreclosure proceedings and the suit is now pending and it is my intention to carry out all orders of the County Court in relation to tax foreclosures as I have in the past.

In this connection, permit me to say that the County Court under date of May 21, 1931, made and entered an order in its records directing the District Attorney and Sheriff to proceed with the foreclosure of the delinquent taxes. So far as I know that is the first order that had ever been formally entered upon said subject, at least, it is the first and only one that had been called to my attention. A few days later on June 5, 1931, an order was made and entered in the County Court from which it appears that there was 5 years' delinquent taxes on property owned by G. Russell Morgan, and the Court upon that date made an order in which it remitted all penalties and interest for the five years upon that property except 6%. In doing so the County Court followed the very procedure that I had advocated a year before to be extended to every delinquent taxpayer, unemployed, widows and orphans and others.

The trial of criminal cases are, indeed an expensive matter and involve expenditure of vast sums of money. If the defendant is acquitted it means that the County must pay any expenses of the proceedings; where convictions are secured fines are generally secured and the costs and expense recovered. During my term of office the recoveries, fines, penalties, forfeitures and costs have exceeded by many thousands of dollars the cost of prosecution; hence

the office has paid the taxpayers a great deal more money than it has cost the taxpayers.

I submit that the person who is most likely to protect the taxpayer is that officer who pays taxes. He only says that he will carry it out without a salaried deputy, which leaves him free to pursue the course of expending for assistance the large sums of money which I have heretofore paid over into the General Fund as hereinabove set forth.
