The Honor of Women

"The honor of American womanhood is now in the hands of a jury in Honolulu," says The Chicago Herald and Examiner during the trial of the four defendants, accused of lynching the Hawaiian for his alleged attack upon the wife of a naval officer.

The Chicago newspapers say the case is of particular interest "because it involves the question of the safety for decent women not only in that garden spot of the Pacific but wherever the white and other races are brought into contact.

Frankly this Hearst newspaper argues for an acquittal if the jury believes that Kahahawai was the ringleader of the gang that perpetrated the brutal and indecent assault upon a white American woman. Brushing aside all other questions as secondary and subordinate the editor says the "real case" is the "cause" of the killing and "not the killing itself."

In other words, if Kahahawai was guilty of the crime charged against him, he got what he deserved, and it "was natural that the husband and the mother of the outraged woman should take the law in their own hands and thereby vindicate the sanctity of womanhood."

We have heard this doctrine before. While it conflicts with some "law and order" talk it continues to have behind it the elemental force of nature and will continue to be asserted under similar circumstances, however much one praises the "sanctity" of the law."

Auto fatalities make a battle look like a skirmish manoeuvre. Aroused public opinion will cause enforcement of traffic laws and this will save lives.

Detectives, in an eastern city, picked up a sorry looking little beggar and took him to headquarters for begging. In his pockets they found \$33,101!

People who have things might as well save them. There is no use to give them away at prevailing prices. Better times are coming if you hold on to what you have.

We don't know how the Massie trial will come out in Honolulu but it has certainly produced some excellent defenses of lynching in the newspapers of this country.

Total Circuit Court Fines from Jan. 1, 1925, to Jan. 1, 1932, \$133,242.59

Total paid State in same period toward support of State Pro. Dept. \$25,656.88. Total of \$107,585.62.

Circuit Court Expense same period including my deputy \$99,425.09.

Excess of fines over and above expense, \$8,160.53.

Above Circuit Court expenses embraces not only cost of all criminal cases including Grand Jury, trial jury and witnesses but in addition the entire cost to the county of all civil and equity cases, the court reporter, bailiff, Judge's Secretary, together with Circuit Court supplies and expenses and furniture for the new Circuit Court supplies and expenses and furniture for the new Circuit Court room and still leaves an excess of \$8,160.53. The above figures do not include the cost of the Bowles case which was paid by Multnomah County.

The fines above stated do not include Justice Court fines and fees which for the same period amounted to \$14,113.20, which is not segregated on the records as to civil fees and criminal fines.

During my tenure as District Attorney I have always furnished and maintained my own office, my own library, my own car for official business and most of the supplies and equipment used by my office in official work without cost or expense to the taxpayer, and if elected will continue to do so.

In conformity with the order of the County Court dated May 21, 1931, I am now rendering the required legal service to the Sheriff in foreclosing the delinquent taxes and will in the future render all legal services required in tax foreclosures as well as other matters.

Washington County has never paid out one dollar for outside legal services since I have been District Attorney.

Control of Money Controls Price on all Commodities Necessary to Life

It takes creative and consuming power as well as buying power to make prosperity in our modern day civilization.

The great mass of our people with their skilled hands and modern machinery have the creative power and with their families have the consuming power. In pioneer days that was all that was necessary to make a happy and prosperous people. But in our modern day of civilization we have developed into specialists and no longer the family lives unto itself. The individual sells his commodity in the form of labor or some article labor produced, in exchange for which he receives a "medium of exchange."

By the same method the "Dollar" can control the credit system of our nation, and once in control it is only necessary to bring on a new deflation until it will have control of our transportation, manufacturing and distribution system; and in control of this machinery price of manufactured articles can be held at a high level while the raw product may be worthless.

Probably you have never thought of money as a crop, but I want to drive home to you now that it is a crop just as much as wheat, corn, and cotton, I also want to drive home to you that those who control the crop of money can control the value thereof.

The thing that has caused all the trouble that we are now enduring is that congress has delegated the power to regulate and coin money over to a handful of international bankers of this country.

In 1863 when President Lincoln was prosecuting the Civil War, the banking interests of Wall Street saw a chance to put over the National Bank act, notwithstanding the fact that the nation was in a terrific strife to preserve the union.

They refused to support Lincoln unless he signed the National Bank Bill of 1863. Under these conditions he signed it and that was the time he made this famous statement: "I fear more terribly now for the safety of my country than in the darkest hours of the rebellion. The wealth of our nation will be concentrated in the hands of a few and with that wealth will go the power and liberties of our nation, and a new form of slavery will saddle itself upon our people that will be more cruel and destructive than that form of slavery we now seek to abolish."

In 1916 Congress again turned over to the bankers of this country the regulation of the crop and value of money when it enacted the Federal Reserve System. Today we have practically no money in circulation except that put out by the National Banks and the Federal Reserve System.

Today we find a handful of international bankers in New York who control the 20,000 banks scattered all over our nation. They control the activities of our people just like an operator standing at a switch board and by pressing a button can hold complete control of a huge hydro-electric development. If our people demand better living conditions the international bankers can bring on a deflation just as we now endure, leaving our people hungry and homeless while wealth is concentrated more and more into the hands of the few, giving those few still more power.
