matter of pure military expediency, some one should be executed for the moral effect such action may have upon the other soldiers, a proposition which finds no sanction in the law or the military history of this country."

"The cases became the subject of spirited, not to say violent, controversy in the war department which indeed reached back across the Atlantic, and Clark was in the storm center. But four lives were involved and Clark is a fighter. He stood pat. Some of his superior officers who at first severely criticized and disapproved his views came around to his side. The final result was that Clark's reviews went, with the records, to the secretary of war who transmitted them to the president of the United States with a recommendation that the sentences be not carried into effect. The result already has been stated."

So the firing squad was not called out to complete the services of these four boys and it might be said that two of them later distinguished themselves by conspicuous acts of bravery and both met honorable death in battle.

Kenneth Harlan Platform "New Leadership and a New Deal"

Kenneth Harlan, Republican candidate for United States Senator, has adopted for his slogan "New Leadership and a New Deal." With election less than a month away, the Harlan forces are elated over the support accorded their candidate.

Harlan is making his fight on a platform that has wide appeal. Brought to Oregon in 1928 by George Joseph to assist in defeating the merger of the two big electric power companies in Portland, Mr. Harlan has long been a proponent of the Joseph principles. He advocates Government ownership of power, increased taxes on large incomes, lower taxes on small incomes and the dissolution of great monopolies. He believes that adjusted compensation should be paid to war veterans immediately, and recognizes the crying need for an adequate old age pension law.

Harlan's plan for a standard working week and a standard minimum wage will go far to eliminate unemployment. He urges Federal farm relief to meet local conditions and the restoration to the people of the Constitutional right of free speech, free assembly and free petition, no matter by whom.

His stand on the wet issue is clear. "The people have a right to vote on Prohibition the same as any other public question," Harlan says. "Congress can and should provide a system of referendum which would permit the people to vote on whatever questions or issues interest them. If prohibition fails, then Government manufacture, control and sale of liquor should follow. I am opposed to private ownership of liquor making or selling establishments."

Mr. Harlan is for the protection of the lumber industry and nails his platform together with this plank. "Place individual rights, the rights of humanity, above property rights and dollar autocracy at all times and in all things."

Mr. Harlan plans an immediate statewide campaign when his program for the development of state resources will be presented to the voters.

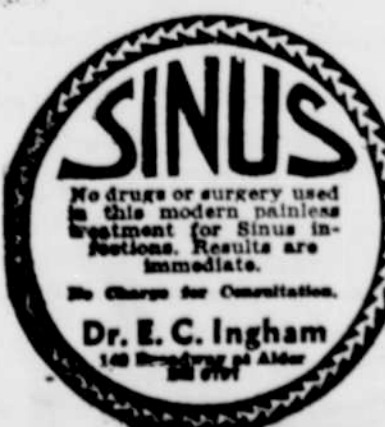
