THE BONUS FIGHT HOOVER CONFIDENT ECONOMY PLANS CLASH LABOR OPPOSES CUTS SMITH ATTACKS HOOVER THE NOMINATION STATUS ABOUT DISBARMENT

The fight for cashing the veterans' compensation certificates moves along its Congressional paths with increasing but disputed evidence that the soldiers of the nation are thoroughly in favor of immediate payment, regardless of the resolution to the contrary passed at the Detroit convention in response to the personal appeal of President Hoover.

The fact that the officials of the federal reserve system are opposed to the proposal, the opposition of the administration, with a veto certain, and the determination of leaders of both parties to fight against it, have not dampened the ardor of proponents, who insist that the measure will pass both houses.

However, it is known that President Hoover is confident that the proposal will be defeated, basing his confidence upon assurance from Republican and Democratic leaders. High officials say the effort is no longer a "menace" and seem satisfied that no such bill will pass Congress. Opposition to payment at this time centers on the assertion that the country is in no position to stand the financial strain.

The House economy committee and the President fail to agree upon measures of retrenchment, the difference being largely over salary reductions. The Democratic slash of eleven per cent on all salaries over \$1,000 is opposed by the Chief Executive, who in turn, proposes a "staggered furlough" plan, involving thirty day leaves without pay for government employees, or even a five-day week, which would eliminate the half-day labor on Saturdays.

The opposition of the American Federation of Labor to any salary cuts is well known. However, certain leaders insist that the government must follow the example of industry if necessary to balance the budget. Slashes in appropriation bills it is asserted, will effect large savings, and if coupled with salary reductions, will more than answer the demand to keep expenditures below receipts.

Democrats met last week in the nation's capital and were a little surprised at a bitter attack upon Gov. Roosevelt by no other one than Alfred E. Smith, who declared he would take off his coat and fight any candidate making a "demagogic appeal to the working people of this country" and thus setting "class against class, and rich against poor."

Smith's carefully prepared speech did not mention Roosevelt's name but his reference was obvious. The New York governor or, in a radio address, recently gave his opinion that the man "at the bottom" has been

J. O. Johnson Candidate for Representative Outlines Platform



In the voters pamphlet issued dur- ing the last week J. O. Johnson, at- torney, seeking nominations for State Representative of Washington county, sets forth his platform which is receiving favorable comment. Mr. Johnson was the only candidate for representative to take advantage of the voters pamphlet issued by the state. His platform is as follows:

"If nominated and elected as rep- resentative of Washington county, I will advocate and support only such legislation as is essential to the wel- fare and progress of the state and my county. I shall have no time for special interests or experiments, always safeguarding the interests of the people and taxpayers with a strict economy program.

"I am in favor of the Governor's tax reduction program and propose to scrutinize carefully all appro- priations.

"Education of our children is of first importance to our future wel- fare and I propose to give consid- erable attention to methods of ob- taining a portion of the revenues for this purpose through general state taxation, thereby relieving farmers and other property owners in the small communities of an unjust and unfair tax burden.

"If necessary to secure equaliza- tion and reduction of hydro-electric power rates, I favor public owner- ship."
