Looking at Washington

The Federal Reserve System is directed to employ its control over credit and currency in an effort to restore commodity prices to about the 1926 level, under the Goldborough bill, which passed the House by an overwhelming vote of 289 to 60. The proponents of the measure insist that it does not call for unbridled inflation but instructs the Federal Reserve System to pursue more vigorously the policy that it is now trying out and by the purchase of government securities in the open market to expand the credit facilities of the nation.

The recent activities of the Re-

serve Board along this line were too conservative to suit the large majority of the House and prompt passage of this bill resulted. Representative Steagall insists that Congress expects the Federal Reserve to exhibit the same control over prices that was demonstrated in 1920 and 21, when they were sharply deflated. He feels that a reasonable amount of additional credit and currency at this time will start a rise in prices.

It is interesting that Governor Harrison of the New York Federal Reserve Bank testified before the Banking and Currency Committee, that Congress was insisting that the reserve banks do the very thing they were doing. Opposition to the measure is general in financial circles where it is recognized that the abnormal fall in prices must be checked to precede general recovery.

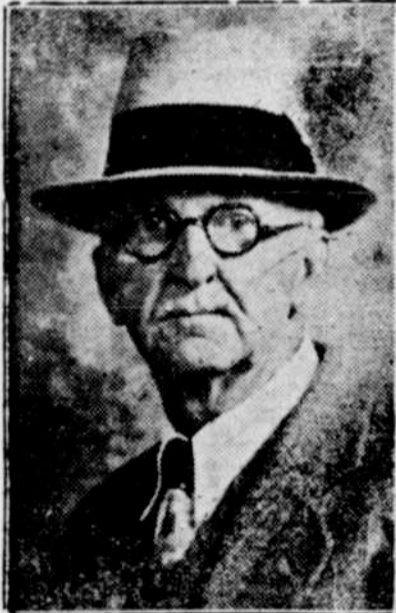

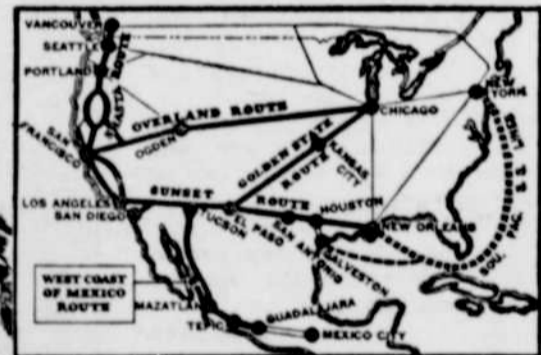
