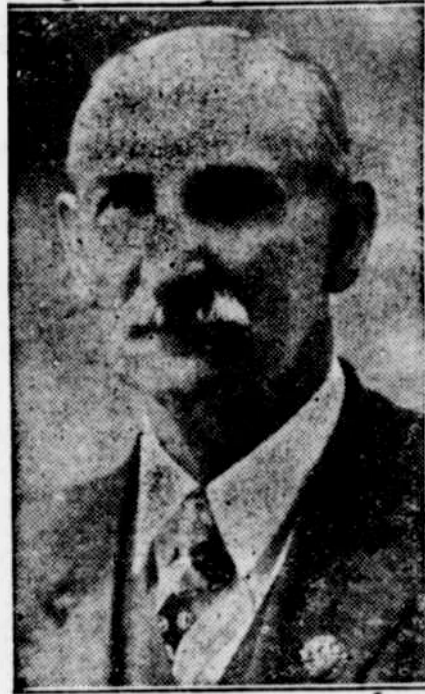
My record as County Judge from January, 1925, to January, 1931, speaks for itself. At the time I took office in January, 1925, the warrant indebtedness of the County was around \$170,000. We kept the business of the County up and at the end of the year, 1925, had the indebtedness of \$170,000 wiped out. The next five years of my office the county was on a cash basis. Ten months after I left office in January, 1931 warrants for the county were being discounted and it is again in debt to the amount of \$65,000.

What is the matter?
The new court house and jail were built during my administration. We kept within our limit and when the buildings were completed everything was all paid.

I favor good roads, but do not believe in making them a burden on the taxpayer. The roads now built should be maintained and kept in good shape. If possible to get a special tax for roads in one road district, I am in favor of reorganizing the road districts so those who desire may vote a special tax for roads in their locality.

Statement of
J. W. CONNELL, Sheriff

During my time as Sheriff the record shows 373 arrests classified about as follows: 23 non-support cases, 38 stills taken and destroyed, 270 cases of possession and sale of liquor, 150 cases of larceny, 75 cases of driving while intoxicated, 23 forgery cases, 51 cases of contributing to delinquency, 245 miscellaneous arrests for minor offenses such as reckless driving, game violations, assault and battery, etc. I have not attempted to specialize on the enforcement of any one law but have done everything in my power to enforce ALL LAWS. From these 875 arrests the fines and jail sentences in Circuit Court alone totaled more than \$181,000 and 130 years in jail.

In former years we had laws in force such as the speed law. The State Traffic Department was bringing into the Court every day violators of the law while at the present there is no speed law and no one is brought in which makes a difference in the amount of fines turned into the Treasurer's office. Owing to the general depression there is no money in circulation and offenders are unable to pay their fines. For that reason we have more prisoners than in former years and our jail facilities have increased from 24 to 150 capacity. During my administration we have decreased the cost of keeping prisoners from \$1.00 to approximately 35 cents per day and the prisoners in our charge care for the lawn and do part of the janitor work without extra cost to the County.

Some people seem to have the idea that before an officer should make an arrest he should take the offender down roll him to see if he has any money to pay a fine and if he has not to turn him loose. This is NOT my policy. I have always endeavored to do my duty as I saw it. I have at all times tried to keep people out of trouble which in my opinion is where an officer can be of considerable assistance to the public. Performing my duty as a peace officer I have been successful in handling at least three situations which might have resulted in serious consequences.

During my administration we have had few criminal trials. There is a reason for this and our office claims some of the credit. The efficient preparation of criminal cases in many cases have resulted in pleas of guilty saving the expense of trials.

As to the economy program which has been in vogue for some time, I went to the County Court more than a year and one-half ago and advised the Court that I could get along with only two deputies in our work. At which time it was agreed that we would try it. Certain things came to pass unknown to me that my third deputy still retained his position. When the budget committee met in November 1931 I asked for a reduction in our budget and was successful in cutting \$2,020 off of the budget in the criminal department and 15% off the costs of the tax collecting department. Consequently we take this much credit in reducing your taxes. Anyone interested can easily verify this.

I have given my entire time to the County as Sheriff both day and night for the past three years and there has never been a robbery or any other crime committed that I have not been on the job as soon as notified of the same. I have at all times, after regular hours come to the office and issued automobile license, shipping tags for beef, pork, veal, poultry, etc., to anyone desiring the same. I have taken care of all complaints that have come into our office and all complaints of law violations have been promptly and thoroughly investigated. We have kept a complete record of all criminal work and finger prints of all offenders, and performed every other duty pertaining to the office. We have

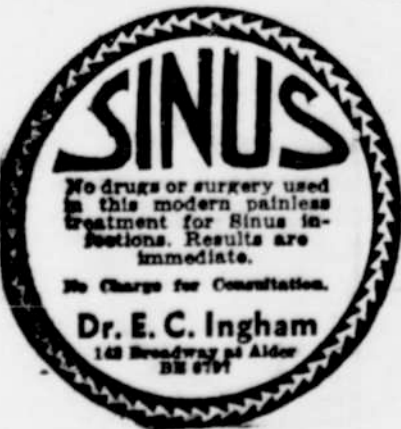
at all times treated the residents of this County and State in a courteous manner.
