



"Grand Hotel" Opens Today at Fox Broadway Theatre

Mail orders are being accepted at the Fox Broadway theatre for the sensation screen offering, "Grand Hotel," which opens a week's engagement Thursday, May 19. Two performances will be given daily and all seats are reserved.

One of the chief thrills in Viki Baum's novel "Grand Hotel," which was missed on the stage, is to be found in the screen version that will be shown in Portland. The film boasts of a star-spangled cast, in the galaxy being Greta Garbo, John Barrymore, Joan Crawford, Wallace Beery and Lionel Barrymore.

The thrill that the stage version missed in the spectacular balcony leap made seven floors above the street, when Baron von Gaigern (John Barrymore) gains access to Griginskaya's (Garbo's) room in the attempt to steal a prized string of pearls.

In the stage adaptation of Miss Baum's novel, this scene was necessarily eliminated and a less exciting entrance arranged for the Baron. The screen play, however, combined the book with the theatre manuscript.

John Barrymore, as the Baron, negotiates the perilous jump from one balcony to another the distance being six feet. Only a two-inch ledge offers security when he is obliged to divide the leap into two sections, swaying against the building wall as he looks down and sees the city traffic seven stories beneath him.

Alfred E. Clark States His Position Regarding the 18th Amendment

The following states my position with respect to the 18th Amendment and the Volstead Act.

In November, 1914, the people of the state of Oregon adopted an Amendment to the Oregon Constitution prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors. This constitutional provision and the laws enacted to carry the same into effect still remains in full force and effect. Under them Oregon was bone dry for some years before the 18th Amendment or the Volstead Act was passed. If the 18th Amendment were repealed, or the Volstead Act modified, the situation in the state would not be changed. Oregon would still be bone dry under its own constitution and laws. So long as the constitution and laws of the state of Oregon, prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquor within the state, remain unchanged, nothing Congress could do would legalize the manufacture or sale of intoxicating liquor in Oregon. Political promises or statements to the contrary are misleading. The only effect that repeal of the 18th Amendment or repeal or modification of the Volstead Act would have in Oregon, would be to put the whole cost of enforcement upon the taxpayers of the state.

I firmly believe the people have a right to pass on any question. In 1914 the people of Oregon passed on the question when they voted the prohibition amendment into the state constitution. They have the right at any time to repeal it. Until they do, Oregon will be dry. Until they have exercised that right and repealed the prohibition amendment to our state constitution, I do not believe it would be to the interests of the people of the state that the 18th Amendment be repealed or the Volstead Act repealed or modified, and if elected to the United States Senate, I will vote according to these views.

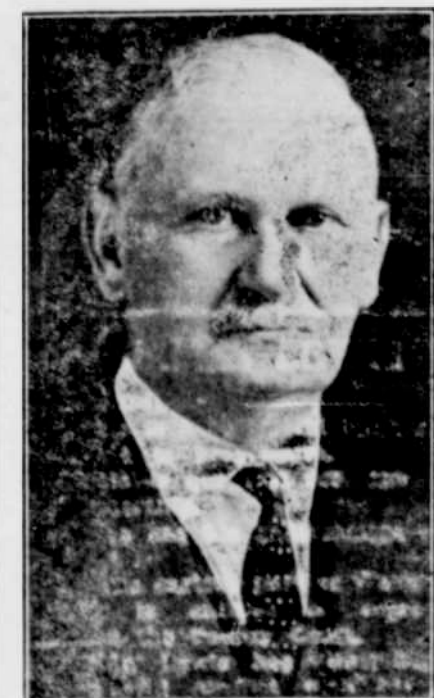

burdened the Federal Reserve with "impossible" duties over its protest, and moreover, threatened uncontrolled inflation. The economy bill was cut from \$200,000,000 to \$40,000,000; a pension bill provides \$100,000,000 for widows and orphans, and the Goldborough bill to stabilize commodity prices was referred to in connection with the Federal Reserve.

Interest is reported in Japan over the transfer of the entire American fleet to the Pacific Coast, but officials of the Foreign Office declare that our move gives Japan no cause for uneasiness and is unlikely to disturb public opinion, although if the transfer is permanent, more public discussion might result.

The statement of Admiral Pratt that the situation in the Orient was if the transfer is made permanent. The Japanese naval attitude in Washington and is accepted in Japan. Japanese naval officers admit that the Japanese navy would consider the situation, but add there is nothing to be done about it and that Japan would not seek any change in the capital ship ratio. This, it is said, was accepted at a sixty per cent ratio, adequate for defense and, in the event of war, the Japanese fleet would maintain a defensive role, guarding home waters.

The evolution of a new foreign policy, based on non-recognition of territorial gains made any nation breaking the terms of the Kellogg Pact, was recently described by William R. Castle, Jr., acting-Secretary of State.

Terming it "the Hoover Doctrine" he said it "put teeth in the Pact" and would turn to "Dead Sea fruit" the spoils of any aggressor which violated the Kellogg agreement. Mr. Castle thus officially outlined what has long been known as the Administration's attitude. It opposes any "official boycott" as likely to lead to war and because such a course would be ineffective and bear down first upon civilians, being almost as disastrous for them as gas attacks from the air on undefended cities and towns.

While he did not refer to the Far East, the application of his pronouncement is plain. However, in this connection, one might wonder how our "non-recognition" will prevent Japan, to use a specific example, from appropriating to herself the spoils gained through her recent Manchurian campaign. While the Administration deserves praise for

its generally approved reaction to the Far Eastern crisis, it is hard to explain how a passive policy will undo the subjugation of territory nation from making permanent a conquest if it is willing to risk an armed clash.
