TO ATTEND CONVENTIONS SENATE VOTES TARIFF DEMOCRATS BADLY DIVIDED RELIEF MEASURES BORAH HOLDS HIS HAND THIRD PARTY TALKS HOOVER SEEKS NEW PLANK BEER SHATTERS PARTIES ROOSEVELT SPEAKS AGAIN WATSON PRAISES SENATE

Congressmen, much interested in attending the national conventions, have under consideration a plan to begin a series of three-day recesses to continue through both conventions. It is hoped that the tax bill will be given to the president by June 10th, allowing Republicans to go to Chicago on the 14th and that, upon their return, the appropriation bills will be taken up and disposed of in the week of June 14th, enabling the Democrats to get to Chicago on June 27th. A gentlemen's agreement would avoid legislation while the members are away. After the convention, about July 5th, economy and relief measures would be fought out.

Tariffs on oil, coal, lumber and copper have been included in the Senate billion-dollar tax bill through the efforts of a powerful coalition of senators wanting tariff action on these commodities. Following the success of the coalition Sen. Norris lost in an effort to include the farm debenture provision, contending that the new tariffs would add to the farmer's burden and they should receive adjustment. However, many senators did not want the tax bill encumbered by a provision almost certain to be vetoed.

An outstanding event is the decision of Senator Borah not to attend the Republican National Convention, nor to lend his influence and ability to platform making. Regardless of whether Congress is in session or not, the Idahoan has let it be known that he will not go to Chicago.

The President "regrets" the refusal of Senator Borah to participate in the party convalescence. In 1928, Borah was a forceful personality on the resolutions committee, and during the campaign a tower of strength to the ticket in the farming areas of the mid-continent. He stumped the agricultural belt for Hoover, was in the highest favor, and is generally given credit for doing much to swing the western and agricultural support to the Hoover ticket.

Talk of a third party follows Borah's decision, especially in view of his dryness and recent warning that, unless Congress took some positive steps to relieve present distress the people would turn to a new party. The Senator broke with a group of administration advisers who sought his help in framing a prohibition plank for the national platform.

The tariff debate in the Senate promises to instigate one of the hardest battles to be waged in the Democratic convention. Party leaders, anxious to denounce the Smoot-Hawley act were against the fact that seventeen Democratic senators voted for the oil tariff. Several of them are determined to wipe out this record by a vigorously worded declaration, regardless of how it might hurt some senators. They do not doubt but that the rank and file of the members of the party are overwhelmingly against such a tariff. Senators Hull, Harrison, and several others, will make the issue but the split is wide and there may be deep scars before the battle is over, because 17 Democrats favored the oil tariff to only 21 against it.

As this is written the Democrats in the Senate are pressing their \$2.- Continued on Page 3

Mary Hatfield, Pioneer School Teacher Passes

Mary Elizabeth Wood was born in Roanoke, Illinois, May 21, 1882, and died at Newberg, Oregon, May 22, 1932, at the age of eighty years and one day. Interment was at River-view cemetery Thursday, May 26th. She was the widow of Dr. C. L. Hatfield, who died at their home in Orenco in 1921.

All her life Mrs. Hatfield had been active in teaching. In 1899 she taught her first school near Roanoke, Illinois, and altogether had twenty one years of teaching experience in Illinois. She was graduated from the Illinois Normal School and from Staunton Female Seminary, Staunton, Virginia. She studied one year in the Woman's Medical College in Chicago.

Her husband's health failed and in 1898 they moved to Oregon and settled in Vernonia which was then a small village. In 1900 Mrs. Hatfield commenced teaching in Vernonia and adjacent schools. Quoting her own words from an autobiography written last summer: "We bought a little 'Bunchgrass pony' and Bess and I traveled through Oregon sunshine, rain and mud for nine years, going from one district to another, often attended by pupils who did not get as much school as they wanted in the three or four months' term in their own district. Including the town school there were five districts within a radius of three or four miles. Some wanted winter, and some summer terms which made it convenient to go from one to another during the entire year. I sometimes had a short vacation between terms but often closed one school on Friday and began another the following Monday which sometimes gave me work each month of the year. It was real pioneer work and I enjoyed it."

In 1909 they moved to Scappoose where she again taught for ten years and this was followed by nine years in the Orenco school. The last six years of her life were spent as teacher in the Oregon State Industrial School for Girls. When her health failed in January of this year, she went to the home of her nephew, Clyde S. Woods at Newberg, Oregon, and during the last few days of her sickness was removed to the Newberg Hospital.

Her teaching experience covered a period of fifty one years. She said "It seems a long time and yet, counting in all the hardships and the criticisms a teacher must meet, together with the disappointments and heartaches, I would not exchange my experience, if I could, for that of the Queen on her throne. And, if I had my life to live over and I could select my work again, I'd choose to be a teacher and try to be a better one. There is nothing else like it."

Mrs. Hatfield was well and favorably known in this community, as for several years she had spent her summers at the home of her stepdaughter, Mrs. C. E. Barker of Aloha.

Wherever she lived she identified herself with the church and was of a deeply religious nature. "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord and their works do follow them."

CHICKEN HOUSE ON GEO. LIPPERT PROPERTY BURNED

Being awakened at one thirty Saturday morning by a neighbor, Geo. W. Lippert found his one hundred and forty foot long chicken house in flames. The fire had so far advanced that it was impossible to get out the tools that were stored in the feed room. The flames consumed the building quickly and within an hour was in ashes.

There were no chickens in the house at the time, but Mr. Lippert had ordered 600 which were to be delivered Tuesday. The Beaverton Fire Department were on hand but were unable to do any good because of the progress the fire had made.

The loss is \$1600, partly covered by insurance. Cause of the fire is unknown.

Tenney of New York City, author of the paper, declared that high-frequency radio waves, similar to those used for trans-oceanic and round-the-world broadcasting, have been remarkably successful in generating artificial fevers that in turn kill micro-organisms responsible for a number of dangerous diseases.

"More than 1000 treatments have been given with this latest adjunct to therapeutics at the Fifth Avenue hospital in New York," Dr. Tenney said. "On the basis of results obtained in these treatments it is concluded that the short wave method of creating high fevers in the human body is far superior to any method yet found, and it produces better results."

FARMERS UNION HOLD CONVENTION AT STATE CAPITOL

The 1932 Oregon State Convention of the Farmers' Educational and Co-operative Union of America, held in Salem, Oregon, ended its three day session May 27th.

The educational committee went on record by recommending the appointment of a committee to investigate educational problems, including the currency of the United States. Lack of knowledge on the part of the general public in regard to the currency system of the country has made it possible for a small group of men to grasp unlimited power. The various systems of currency should be studied by every citizen so that all would thoroughly understand the present Gold Standard and its operations, and the Bimetallist system which would remonetize silver, as proposed in the Wheeler Bill 2487.

Action was also taken in other legislative measures, including the Frazier Bill S 1197, known as the Farmers' Farm Relief Act for the liquidation and refinancing of agricultural indebtedness.

A committee was recommended to study the establishment of an Oregon State owned bank, this committee to meet with the executive committee of the Grange.

The real purpose of the Oswald West bill was also discussed. This bill, drawn up by ex-governor West, is sponsored by the railroads in their efforts to drive motor truck competition from the highways in Oregon. Under the pretense of trying to abolish drunken driving, it cleverly incorporates a drastic blow at independent motor truck haulage, which permits the shipment of farm products at reasonable rates. It would place the farmers and stock men at the mercy of the railroads and their high freight rates. The railroads are seeking to incorporate this measure on the November ballot.

While the Farmers' Union convention was in session, solicitors were on the streets of Salem with long petitions trying to secure signatures for which they were paid ten cents each. Many people were signing. Neither the petitioner nor the signer knew much about the matter. The objective of one was to get ten cents; the other, the good natured citizen who so often carelessly signs his own death warrant. Ex-governor West, who helped draw up this bill, is to be congratulated on his deep understanding of human nature.

In like manner the enactment of the oleomargarine bill was defeated last year.

It should not be possible for petitions to be circulated as a business with a financial reward for every name secured. This is one of the many methods by which capital controls and oppresses the country.
