REPUBLICANS READY SEEK TO RESTORE PRICES SALES TAX BEATEN HOOVER'S SENATE SPEECH ECONOMY MOVES ALONG LABOR FOR GARNER BILL

The Republican Convention will get under way the early part of next week, with the re-nomination of President Hoover as certain as things political can be.

Some division of opinion is looked for when the Convention attempts to write a platform, especially upon the Prohibition subject. As outlined last week there is a growing insistence in the party for a modification plank but preliminary attempts to secure a declaration satisfactory to Wets and Drys failed and brought out the determination of Senator Borah not to attend the Convention. Generally, political leaders expect a plank calling for enforcement of the law but probably with some reference to repeal or modification. It is understood that Senator Borah's position is that no reason exists for a special referendum on the subject because the people have an opportunity, in electing congressmen, to pass on the present laws.

The continued dropping of commodity prices, now in progress all over the world, has moved the British Government to propose an international conference to consider stabilizing prices and the United States has agreed to participate. The general idea is that currency, foreign exchange, the gold standard, silver and other questions will be taken up but that the delegates from this country will be barred from discussing war debts, reparations and disarmament. The ban will probably also include any bargaining for general tariff reductions.

No date has been set for the conference and there is some opinion to the effect that it could not meet prior to the Lausanne parley and that it might not be convoked until this fall. However, economists in Europe are open in their predictions that something must be done at once or the stability of the social order will be imperiled.

Expert authorities can be found for the belief that a more liberal credit policy will tend to stop the shrinkage in prices and that this would be followed by a restoration of confidence which would be reflected in business activity and a gradual increase in prices. The United States and Great Britain seem to have similar views on this subject and the action of the Federal Reserve Board, in extending credit expansion policies, is taken as indicative of American confidence in such an attack on the world-wide depression.

Following the surprise appearance of President Hoover, who visited the Senate to urge speed on the budget-balancing program and to specifically endorse the manufacturer's sales tax, the Senate completed its revenue bill, without the sales tax, but with provisions which Secretary Mills said would guarantee balanced budget.

Committee Appointed to Prepare Occupational Tax

The City Council are drafting an ordinance for a new source of water supply. Phil L. Polsky, who owns land on which the Wessinger springs are located, has made a proposition to the council that he will erect a plant, not to cost over \$10,000 if the city will agree to buy water from him. The water will be piped to the city reservoir, a charge of 16 cents per 100 cu ft or pay a minimum of \$250 a month until the owners are compensated for their investment when the rate shall be reduced to 10 cents per 100 cu ft.

The occupational tax presented by Mayor Wilson at the Monday meeting of the Council, carried and a committee of two councilmen was appointed by the mayor to study the situation and present a feasible way of handling the matter, also to set the amount each business man should pay.

Among the several new lights to be installed is one at the Y on the east end of town, also at the Y on the west end of town, at the corner of Watson and 2nd and the corner of Cedar and Canyon road.

MANY OF NEW U. S. TAXES TAKE EFFECT JUNE 21

Most of the new taxes voted by Congress in the \$1,118,500,000 revenue bill will become effective on June 21.

Excise taxes on various manufacturers will be paid on all goods they release into the channels of trade on June 21 or after.

The new income tax rates—4 per cent on the first \$4000, 8 per cent on the next \$4,000 and surtaxes up to 55 per cent on incomes over \$1,000,000—will be levied for the calendar year 1932. Returns are due March 15, 1933.

The 3-cent first class postage rate goes into effect July 6. The increased second class rates become effective July 1.

All the rest of the new taxes become effective June 21. They are:

Lubricating oil—4 cents a gallon. Wort—15 cents a gallon; malt syrup, 3 cents a pound; grape concentrate 20 cents a gallon.

Tires and tubes—2½ and 4 cents a pound. Toilet preparations—10 per cent, dentifrices 5 per cent.

Furs—19 per cent. Jewelry—10 per cent, (\$3 exemption.)

Automobiles—3 per cent; trucks and accessories 2 per cent.

Radio and photograph equipment—5 per cent. Mechanical refrigerators—5 per cent. Sporting goods and cameras—10 per cent.

Firearms and shells—10 per cent. Matches—Wood, 2 cents per 1000; paper, ½ cent per 1000.

Candy—2 per cent. Chewing gum—2 per cent.

Soft drinks—various rates. Electrical energy—3 per cent on sales for domestic and commercial purposes (to be collected from consumer by power company).

Oil—½ cent a gallon and other Gasoline—1 cent per gallon.

Coal—10 cents per 100 pounds. Lumber—\$3 per 1000 feet.

Copper—4 cents a pound. Telephone messages—10 cents between 50 cents and \$1.15 cents to \$2; telegraph messages, 5 per cent; cable and radio messages 10 cents; leased wire, 5 per cent.

Admissions—1 cent per 10 cents on all over 40 cents.

Oil pipe line charges—4 per cent. Safe deposit boxes—10 per cent. Bank checks—2 cents each.

Issues of bonds and capital stock—10 cents per \$100.

Stock transfers—4 and 5 cents a share.

Bond transfers—4 cents per \$100 par value.

Conveyances—50 cents on \$100 to \$500, 50 cents per \$500 in excess.

Produce sales for future delivery—5 cents per \$100.
