FARM Gossip

is the quality of Willamette valley hay generally satisfactory to the coast dairymen? How can improvements be economically brought about? These are the questions that will form the basis of the work at the hay meetings to be held Thursday June 16 at 1.30 in the Reynolds warehouse at North Plains.
D. D. Hill, of the farm crops department of the Oregon State College, will participate in the meeting. Hay grades will be demonstrated and explained and hay handling methods discussed by Hill and some local people.

Purchase of high priced minerals mixtures for the dairy ration is not necessary. Calcium and phosphorus are the only two minerals likely to be lacking and these may be supplied in steamed or sterilized bone meal flour. These may be fed by mixing two pounds of either with 100 pounds of grain or they may be mixed with equal parts of salt and the animals allowed free access to it.
Phosphorus and lime are usually the only minerals lacking the ordinary dairy ration. These two minerals may be needed in addition to what is contained in ordinary feeds, especially with high producing cows. Legume hays, grain, bran and the high protein concentrates usually are well supplied with phosphorus.
Lime may be more likely to be lacking but if alfalfa, clover or vetch hay is used it may not be necessary to use the lime.

Farmers using chlorate weed killers should take some precautions to keep stock away from treated weed patches. Generally the stock do not have any particular liking for the vegetation that has been sprayed with the chemicals. Sometimes they show a preference for this material.
W. T. Putnam of the Farmington community reports that goats ate some Canada thistles that had been sprayed with the chlorates and that the following day he found two dead goats in the pasture with nothing else to account for their death.

Strawberry root weevil adults are generally making their appearance around the berry fields of the county. Down in the valley the poison bait is being applied now. In some of the fields on the hills they are not out in very large numbers but are beginning to make their appearance and baiting will need to be done very soon. If this control measure is to be effective it is essential that the bait be applied before the adults begin to lay their eggs. If the eggs have been laid before the weevil are killed then there is no use in apply-

WEEKLY EDITORS OF STATE TO VIE FOR KELTY AWARD

School of Journalism, University of Oregon, Eugene, June 19—(Special)—Editorial skill and judgment as displayed through the editorial pages of the weekly newspaper press of Oregon will be the basis on which a large silver loving cup will be presented for the first time this summer to the Oregon weekly newspaper considered by judges to be the best example of editorial craftsmanship.

Paul R. Kelty, editor of the Portland Oregonian, is the donor of the award, which will be made annually. Details of the contest are being conducted by Sigma Delta Chi, men's professional journalism fraternity on the Oregon campus, which also makes an annual award to the best all-round weekly newspaper each year. The Kelty award will be presented at the annual summer meetings of the Oregon State Editorial Association to be held this year on July 14, 15, and 16 at Portland.

In making the announcement of the new awards, both Mr. Kelty and members of the campus journalism fraternity expressed the opinion that the cup would stimulate more interest in editorial excellence throughout the state, as has the all-round weekly cup in the field of general newspaper production.

Sterling Green, president of the Oregon chapter of Sigma Delta Chi, in announcing the award, said: "The local chapter of Sigma Delta Chi is exceedingly pleased with the prospect of the new cup, both because one of Oregon's best-loved and most respected editors is the donor, and because we hope it will stimulate interest in the betterment of the editorial sections of Oregon weeklies."

direct taxes on almost every man, woman and child in the country and added millions of taxpayers to the nation's rolls. The income and gift taxes apply to the full calendar year of 1932, while the additional estate levy went into effect upon the passage of the law. Both are permanent. Most of the excise levies and miscellaneous taxes begin on June 21st and remain in effect until July 1st, 1934, but the postal increase, including a three cents letter rate, and the increase in second class postage, take effect on July 6th.

Simple Recipe Often Enjoyed More Than An Elaborate One

A WELL PREPARED, but inexpensive and simple recipe is often enjoyed far more than one that is overly elaborate. At this time of the year especially, good substantial foods, skillfully seasoned and attractive in appearance, are welcomed by the homemaker whose task it is to serve nourishing, appealing meals to families coming home cold and hungry.

The dishes suggested below are guaranteed to please every appetite.

Casserole of Pork Chops and Noodles: Cook 2 cups egg noodles in boiling salted water for 8 minutes. Drain. Sprinkle 6 pork chops lightly with salt and pepper and brown in a skillet. Add to noodles, 1 small onion minced, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup Tomato Ketchup and 1 1/4 cups water. Put chops in casserole, cover with noodles and sprinkle top with buttered crumbs. Bake at 350°F. for 30 to 40 minutes. A good substantial dish for an every day dinner.

Swiss Steak: Into a thick round steak, pound flour seasoned with salt and pepper. Brown in skillet in beef fat. Place slices of onion on top and sprinkle with chopped green pepper. Combine 1/2 cup Tomato Ketchup and 1 1/2 cups water and pour over meat. Cover and simmer slowly until tender.

Cuban Eggs: In a skillet, place 1 cup sausage and 2 teaspoons finely chopped onion. Fry for 5 minutes and add 4 tablespoons Tomato Ketchup. Add 6 eggs, beaten well and seasoned with 1/2 teaspoon

salt and dash of pepper. Stir gently until cooked and serve on buttered toast.

Baked Ham Slices with Potato: On a large slice of cured ham, 1/2 inch thick, place a one-inch layer of very thinly sliced potatoes. Cover with a similar slice of ham and insert toothpicks to prevent slipping. Sear in a very hot oven (475°F.) until delicately brown. Combine 1/4 cup Tomato Ketchup and 1/2 cup water, and pour over ham. Cover and continue baking in a hot oven (425°F.) about 45 minutes or until tender. Garnish by placing Stuffed Spanish Olives on tops of toothpicks, and with springs of parsley.

Salmon and Corn Patties: Flake a one-pound can of salmon and add 1 cup whole kernel corn, 1/2 cup Tomato Ketchup, 3 tablespoons flour, 2 eggs well beaten and 1 teaspoon salt. Drop by heaping tablespoons in a skillet, the bottom of which is well covered with hot fat. Fry until golden brown, turn and brown other side. Serve hot. Garnish with slices of Genuine Dill Pickle and sprigs of parsley.
