

Looking at Washington

Interested in the results obtained in Lausanne, Switzerland, where thirteen nations are tackling the troublesome problems arising out of war debts and reparations. While the United States is not represented, the fact remains that this government and its attitude is the dominant factor in the whole situation. It is extremely likely that the European nations will attempt to get together on some united basis in order to present a united front to this country and possibly to make formal request for the cancellation of these obligations.

An international transaction of great magnitude, and characterized as one of the most remarkable achievements in financial history, was ended last week when the United States completed the repayment of more than \$2,000,000,000 in gold to foreign countries. The shipment of gold abroad has been active since Great Britain suspended the gold standard last September, reducing the monetary stocks of this country from \$5,015,000,000 to \$3,979,000,000. American bankers express great satisfaction at the successful conclusion of this phase of international finances.

It is estimated that more than \$1,500,000,000 in gold has been transferred to France, Switzerland, Holland and Belgium—the four gold countries of Europe—since September 1st, 1931, either by shipment or by "ear marks" in this country. However, gold stocks in this country have shown a much smaller reduction and bankers declare that the American market has repaid \$2,250,000,000 of foreign balances since 1929, with a loss of only \$400,000,000 of gold.

The Republican Convention last week seemed to hold down news of Democratic activities, but did not prevent leading Democratic candidates from joining in a public appeal for whole-hearted support of the party's candidate. Sixty-one prominent Democrats signed the declaration, binding them to get behind the party nominee and support him loyally including among the signers were Governor Roosevelt, Alfred E. Smith, Newton D. Baker, James M. Cox, and John W. Davis.

Meanwhile political observers see little reason to doubt the success of the Roosevelt candidacy in the face of the great delegation strength which the New York Governor will present to the Convention next week.

The so-called "Bonus Army" continues to camp at the nation's capital although authorities insisted that they formed a grave health menace and appealed to the govern-

nors of all states to turn back the tide of bonus-seeking ex-service men at its source. However, the men continued their orderly conduct as new recruits came into camp. Just what will be gained remains to be seen, but the fact that all leave has been suspended for military men in the Washington area indicates that preparation is being made for an emergency.
