Despite unfavorable economic conditions resulting in an extremely low price for the crop of strawberry growers are going ahead with plans for another year. Growers are not planning on increasing the acreage but some are intending to make improvements in their planting stock with the idea of making their production more efficient and economical.

Much of the uneven growth apparent in our berry plants is due to disease, according to George M. Darrow of the United States Department of Agriculture and S. M. Zeller of the Oregon Experiment Station. Root weevil, crown borer, spittle bugs, and leaf spot all account for some of our trouble in the berry plantings. Good healthy, vigorous plants are necessary where good yields of berries are obtained. Anything that dwarfs the plant results in decreased yield. In talking to growers at field meetings in the county recently Darrow and Zeller have mentioned a disease they call "crinkles" as the cause of some of our grief. This is a virus trouble which can be eliminated only by selecting runner plants that come from parent stock that is free from the trouble. Several growers have started this selection work either with their own stock or with certified planting stock from Washington.

One or two new strawberry varieties are interesting growers in this county. One of these as yet has only a number and is referred to by that number which is "520." This is a berry that has the characteristics to make it suitable for the cold pack trade. Growers who have it or have seen it, are generally interested as it presents a very attractive appearance and the berries are all of a uniform shape. Processors and handlers are cooperating in giving this berry a trial to see if it is going to prove satisfactory to the trade. "Corvallis number 12" is another variety which some few growers are trying. This is strictly a canning berry so apparently has only limited possibilities.

Strawberry growing has been profitable in Washington County and should continue to be so under normal conditions. During the past winter and spring it has been ap-

parent that we have some berries planted on land where in some years we are going to lose them. With suitable land a grower who is in the strawberry business can well afford to stay in but attention to improvement is necessary.

Potato certification blanks are again being mailed to potato growers in Washington County. Apparently about the same acreage of certified seed will be grown this year as last. With approximately 200 acres last year the supply of certified seed in this county has all been cleaned out. There are no major changes in the certification requirements and the fee requirements and the fee for certification remains the same.

For certification fields of potatoes must pass two field inspections and one bin inspection. No potatoes may pass as certified when they are growing within 300 feet of other potatoes that are too diseased to pass except when there is some natural barrier to prevent the spread of the disease. Field showing varietal mixtures will not pass. There must not be more than a to-

**No Civil Service Jobs Open**

Denouncing a new racket designed to squeeze a few dollars from the vanishing funds of the jobless, the U. S. Civil Service Commission courses of "coaching" for civil mission warns against schools semi-service examinations.

The Commission says these schools are accepting money under false pretenses because in most cases where vacancies occur, there is already a long list of eligible candidates for the job. "Money paid for Civil Service course at this time might just as well be thrown to the four winds," says the Commissioner's warning.

**Mt. Angel College Herd Tops 350 lbs Fat Average**

The registered Holstein herd owned by Mt. Angel College Stock farm at Mt. Angel, Oregon, has completed its first year in the Herd Improvement Registry Test and according to The Holstein Friesian association of America, the high average yield of 11,206 pounds of milk and 3524 pounds of fat was made for 34 cows. Thirteen cows in the herd were young making their records as two, three and four-year olds. Fifteen exceeded the 400-pound fat mark and Santiam Pauline Valdesa, an eight-year-old led the herd with a yield of 21,060 pounds of milk and 668 pounds of fat. Eight of the cows made their records in Class A (four milkings a day) and the balance in Class B (three milkings a day).

The Herd Test was started four years ago by the Holstein association and is proving quite popular as it affords an economical means of obtaining records on all the cows in a herd. These records are preserved and published in a book each year and serve as an invaluable aid in proving herd sires and building a sound breeding program. Provision is made for the voluntary cancellation of registration papers on the low producing purebreds thus removing them from the herd books and raising the general average quality of the breed. To date, about eleven per cent of the Holsteins in the Herd Test have been weeded out by having their registry papers cancelled.
