HEAVY TOLL FROM FIRES HIT VALLEY DURING WEEK PAST

Beaverton, Oregon, July 8.—Fire broke out in the Charlie Fry home on the Canyon road about 2:30 Friday morning and the house was burned to the ground. But few personal belongings were saved. Wind fanned the flames, carrying burning shingles which endangered the safety of the Rossi home, and McCready Lumber Co. St. Cecilia church was also doomed, due to the intense heat, but local firemen diligently kept water streaming on the building which was the only thing that saved the parochial institution.

Aloha, Ore., July 8.—The Fourth of July proved a disastrous one for J. B. Sutton, when he and his five children were helpless in keeping his home from burning to the ground shortly before noon. Practically all the furnishings of the first floor were saved, while that on the second were a total loss. The place was partly covered by insurance.

Mrs. Sutton has been confined to the Hillsboro hospital for the past week.

Tigard, Oregon, July 8.—Fire broke out in the early Sunday morning completely destroyed the house and close surrounding buildings on the B. K. Sheckla place on the Durham road, three miles from Tigard. Origin of the fire is undetermined and the fire spread so quickly that there was no possible chance of saving the house. It started in the house and spread to the outer buildings and completely consumed all except the barn which is located a hundred feet from the dwelling.

Residents of Tigard heard their telephones ring about 3 o'clock Sunday morning and the telephone operator made known the fire and said that any help would be appreciated. A large crowd gathered but were unable to do anything with the flames which were gathering momentum.

Two automobiles were burned along with all the furniture in the house and a small calf in the outer shed. One automobile was driven out of the garage and burst into flames immediately. Total loss will probably run up to \$5000.

Aloha Wins a Good One

Aloha's fast traveling baseball team turned in another win last Sunday by winning from the Shea Bros. Transfer team 9 to 1, on the U. I. diamond in Portland. It was the best game that Aloha has played this season.

The game was clinched in the 8th when Aloha scored five runs on six hits including a double by Rosebrough over the right field screen. Another was added in the ninth on singles by McBreen and E. Homrich and an infield out.

Erickson pitched a fine game, allowing only five hits and striking out six men. A double play in the third helped him out of a hole.

McBreen and Sagor each got three hits for Aloha.

The team plays the Normadale Aces on the Rose City diamond Sunday, July 10. It is hoped that more local people will accompany the team and give their support.

AIRPORT IN LINE WITH PROPOSED COUNTY ROAD

Beaverton, Oregon, July 8.—Mr. Davis of the National Aircraft Airport, appeared before the city council at their meeting Monday, to ask their influence in protesting the proposed county road thru the local airport. A committee of three selected by Mayor Wilson will attend the hearing in the county court and enter a protest against opening the proposed road.

Recorder Richey received instructions to call \$1000 of the \$4500 water bond issue.

Mr. McKenzie, of Hillsboro, informed the council of certain tax certificates he is holding on Block 22 Hockens addition in Beaverton. In order to protect the street assessments of the property, the city took under consideration the advisability of taking care of back taxes and acquiring title to the property.

Bids presented by W. E. Baxter and Grant H. Nordstrom for the hauling of refuse were accepted by the council.

The light committee when being questioned regarding the new contract for lights with the P. E. P. company, stated that the contract is not ready for acceptance.

A report was given that property owners along Watson street are installing their own sidewalks.

Tables of rates covering fireman's insurance, were presented by the Beaverton Finance company and N. J. Skee. No action was taken.

The street commissioners were instructed to measure and order oil for Lombard street to Allen providing they found it necessary.

Ordinance No. 137 concerning the new water supply for the town was laid on the table until the next regular meeting in August. The meeting was then adjourned until July 11th.

NO JOBS AVAILABLE FOR OREGON NORMAL SCHOOL GRADUATES

Aurora, Oregon, July 8.—Astounding as it appears to Oregonians, the three normal schools of the state—Monmouth, LaGrande, and Ashland—are graduating more school teachers every year than are positions open for them to fill in the grade schools of the state—and they cannot teach elsewhere because their certificates are not up to standard requirements.

There were about 800 teachers graduated in 1932 by Oregon normals. They now teach a short, two-year course in these schools.

"One of the graduates applied for work in the state of Washington, just across the river from her Oregon home," said Dr. Hector McPherson, who is supporting the consolidation bill, which among other things will provide a standard four-year course teacher college to succeed the university at Eugene.

"The deputy superintendent for Washington wrote the young lady: 'It will be necessary for you to earn fifteen credits in the third year normal course in order to be eligible for elementary certification in Washington. The normal schools of Oregon and Idaho are credited for only two years of work only. The additional work may be done in a Washington Normal School or in California.'

"The logic of this situation is that an Oregon boy or girl is wasting his or her time by attending any existing Oregon normal. They cannot get work here because there are more teachers than jobs. They can't get work elsewhere because their certificates do not rate high enough.

"That situation shows an economic loss to the state and to the graduates, and gives Oregonians a job that must hurt their pride.

"The consolidation bill puts a teacher college at Eugene to occupy the university buildings. Offering a four-year standard course the calibre of our own teachers will be broadened, and if we cannot give all graduates a job in Oregon they will be equipped to land one elsewhere.

It is sound sense and economy to consolidate."

FARMERS COOPERATIVE UNION OPPOSED TO HIGH AUTO LICENSES

Hillsboro, Ore., July 8.—The regular monthly meeting of the Washington County Unit, The Farmers' Educational and Cooperative Union of America, will take place in the court room at Hillsboro, Oregon, Saturday evening, July ninth, starting at 7:30.

It is desired to take some action on the high priced new automobile licenses, and other important matters.

The opinion is expressed everywhere that flat rate of three dollars is fair. It will put thousands of automobiles back on the highways. The money received through the increased number of licenses issued, as well as the enormously larger amount of gasoline that would be sold, would not only make up for the difference between the present license charge and the three dollar rate, but show a handsome profit. The present prohibitive license fee will most effectively restrict Oregon's beautiful highways to a handful of well to do people, whose handsome cars, of course, add more to the beauty of the landscape than those the high license will bar.

In addition, the usurious rates of interest demanded by the banks and other money lenders should be discussed. In many states interest above six per cent is usury and treated as a crime. In Oregon, apparently there is no restriction. Under the present laws the government hands over all the money of the country to the banks to put in circulation, and before these money lenders will give us our own money they force us to pay them all kinds of interest. With most of them the sky is the limit.

Farmers, do come out. Let us make our resolutions and all stand firmly behind them. Let us stand for Flag and Country and repudiate the racketeering as bankers. The Government should put its money into circulation through public works, without bond issues, and own and control its own banks. The postal savings banks are safe and most successful. The Government must take over all other banking before any betterment of conditions can be made permanently effective.
