Correspondence

Beaverton, Oregon, July 6, 1932
 Editor Beaver-on Enterprise:
 Many of my friends and acquaintances having made inquiries about my recent trip to California, I write these lines hoping it may be of interest to some of your readers.

On Monday, June 6th at 6 a. m. Mrs. Hedge and I, with Van Brown at the wheel, left Beaverton, arriving at Grants Pass about 5 p. m. Next day we arrived at my daughter's home, Chico, Calif., after a most pleasant trip. Put in about a week sight-seeing around Chico, then left Mrs. Hedge with daughter Zola and Van and I moved on, stopping for short call at home of an old friend, Walter Harris in Sacramento, thence on to home of daughter Marjory, in Alameda. Next day we made big drive to Los Angeles, arriving at my daughter's home, Olathe, about 8:30. I had no idea of the immensity of Los Angeles until I began to drive over the city. If Portland would take in Forest Grove, Oregon City, Gresham and Vancouver I doubt if it would equal Los Angeles in territory or population. I called at home of our old townsman Frank Dietsch and found him just liberated from his school. He has been teaching as substitute in day school and regular teacher in night school in Pasadena. He has his contract for night school with what seems good prospect for position as regular day teacher in L. A., but since there are about 8000 idle teachers in southern California, he will feel better when he gets his contract.

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around we drove up to a fine big filling station in Whittier, and Bud Hunter greeted us. John was out at the time. The boys have one of the best equipped and handy stations seen on my trip, and from appearances are getting more than their share of business. We made attempt to call on our old friend "Bob" Kennedy and Johnny Chilton, former Beaverton residents, but thru error in address missed them. I found Robert Kennedy all right in Riverside, but when he answered door-bell I quickly saw he was not the Robert Kennedy I knew in Beaverton long ago, however I got to see a lot more of Southern California. Spent one day in trip to Catalina Islands and from the glass bottomed boats viewed the many fish and submarine gardens which was an interesting sight to me. Did not get seasick and enjoyed trip immensely. Catalina is about 30 miles off shore and two hours ride. After 8 days spent seeing very small part of Los Angeles we went back to my daughters in Alameda. On morning of June 28th we again headed north, crossing San Francisco Bay from Richmond to San Quentin, thence north thru Eureka and Crescent City, Marshfield to Salmon river cut off stopping few minutes with Fred Knorr the Beaverton butcher, arriving home Thursday evening 5:15, June 30th. The trip thru the big Red wood forests can't be described. We saw lots of fine country and good looking towns, but best of all was found when we entered Washington County and Beaverton.
