Funeral Services Held for Wesley R. Starbuck of Hiteon District

Beaverton, July 22—Wesley Raymond Starbuck, aged 62 years, died suddenly after a heart attack Saturday morning at the home of Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Foss in the Hiteon district. Mr. Starbuck had been an exceptionally well and healthy man until the day of his death.

Mr. Starbuck was born in Davenport, Iowa, in December, 1869. Here he spent his early life, learning the trade of a brass molder. While he was quite young he was married but his wife died after only eight months.

Mr. Starbuck then left Iowa and, after several years came to Portland, Oregon, to become employed by Mrs. M. Marshall, and, except for occasional periods, has made his home with her family ever since. Last fall Mr. Starbuck came out to Beaverton to help her son, Mr. Foss, as he was doing at the time of his death.

His only surviving relative is a brother Rayford W. Starbuck of Beasley, Minn., but a host of friends mourn his loss.

OBITUARY

Tigard, July 22 — Mrs. Charity Chapman Cox was born in Witt, Illinois, May 6th, 1875; died at the Good Samaritan hospital, Portland, Oregon, at 5 o'clock Tuesday morning, July 19th, 1932, aged 57 years 2 months and 13 days. Until a few days before death Mrs. Cox had been taking care of her property here as usual but had not been feeling well, consulting her physician she discovered an operation was necessary and same resulted in her death.

Her parents moved from Illinois to Oregon when she was a small child in the year 1881 and settled at Sellwood where deceased spent most of her life, for a number of years she was engaged in abstract business in Portland, locating in her present home at Tigard twelve years ago where she has resided till the time of her death. Her family were pioneer settlers in the Sellwood community and active in the development of that portion of Portland, her mother being one of the few remaining charter members of the first Methodist church organized there, from which place the funeral was held Thursday afternoon at 2:30. Services were conducted by the Rev. Fields assisted by Rev. Mortimer Clark.

The remains were laid to rest in Lincoln Memorial Park cemetery, by the side of her father Joseph D. Chapman and her brother Russell who preceded her in death. She leaves to mourn her loss her aged mother, Mrs. L. M. Chapman, who for the past few years had made her home with her, one sister Mrs. Maude Chapman Christopher of Olympia, Wash., and one brother, Roy L. C. Chapman of Tigard, Ore. Ford V-8 Reveals good

Stamina in Demonstration

"The stamina, economy and endurance of the Ford V-8 was strikingly demonstrated recently when Eddie Pullen, famous racing driver and his crew drove a Ford V-8 33,301 miles in 33 days, 4 hours, 35 minutes—the equivalent of three years' normal driving in one month. The run was made near Rosamond, California, in the Mojave Desert, and lasted from June 6 to July 9," according to C. J. Bielman.

"Results of this unique test designed to test the performance of the Ford V-8 under harder than average driving conditions showed that the car averaged 41.8 miles per hour throughout the entire distance."

"Three regular drivers covered the major portion of the mileage but over 150 interested spectators piloted the car for nearly 5,000 miles. A 32-mile course was used and during the run the car was driven over 12,181 miles of pavement, 17,490 miles of oiled road, and 3,630 miles of rough dirt road. "Throughout, the run was under the observation of Los Angeles newspaper representatives and the timing was officially checked by Western Union."

TAX AUTHORITIES OPPOSE COLLEGE CONSOLIDATION

Test of Factual Analysis Reveals Measure as Not Economical

Portland, July 22—Educational and tax authorities alike are fast lining up as opponents of the proposed measure to move the University of Oregon to Corvallis and to affect other changes in the educational system of the state.

Those interested in the tax side of the question brand the measure as unsound and condemn the claims of the proponents that measure would save nearly \$1,000,000 in tax money annually. Rather it would necessitate the expenditure of large sums to make the necessary readjustments, they say, and to maintain the larger and unwieldy unit, at the problem from an angle of educational efficiency and prestige for the state, maintain that the larger school proposed by the measure would mean a distinct backward step in educational progress of the state, effecting a much wider breach between student and instructor and seriously hampering the possibility of many of Oregon's most worthy students from attaining a university education.

C. C. Chapman, editor of the Oregon Voter, in an analytical discussion of the proposed measure has said:

"The measure and the promises made in its behalf will not stand up as an economy measure under the test of actual analysis."

He states further: "On the face of it, the claim that all these institutions (combined school at Corvallis, law school at Salem, junior colleges at Ashland and LaGrande, teacher's college at Eugene, medical school at Portland, extension service at Portland, and general administration headquarters now at Salem) can be operated under the new scheme for less than it now costs to operate one of them (Oregon State College) is the claim that is extravagant."

The commission of trained educational experts which conducted the fact-finding survey of the institutions has said:

"Quite apart from the historical background and sentiment the state now has a large investment on both campuses. There is no practical means of getting this investment back from either campus if one were abandoned. Both must be utilized now, and the problem now is to propose a plan which will insure the most economical future development."

The unified plan, outlined by the State Board of Higher Education following this survey after two years of further study and put into effect on July 1, accomplishes this end. The proposed bill disregards this fact and the fact that the board has already cut expenses approximately \$1,000,000 a year. To cut this amount another \$1,000,000 would be to wipe out all state support and wreck the entire system.

The State Board of Higher Education has made the statement: "The schools will be operated on a biennial budget almost \$2,000,000 less than when the present board took charge. Under the initiative measure the schools would be operated next biennium at a saving of \$2,000,000 but would require increased legislative appropriation for buildings of several millions, a repudiation of bonded indebtedness totalling large sums, and the abandonment of valuable plants and properties."
