Safeway Store Holdup Man

Multnomah, July 29.—A man identified as Joe Harger, ex-employee of the Safeway store at Multnomah, held up John Humfield, manager, Tuesday morning, for the second time in a month, taking \$50 at the point of a gun.

Harger took \$75 in the same manner June 30 and escaped before officers could reach the scene, deputy sheriffs say. He was sought in Oregon and California without success, according to the sheriff's office.
