Bugs Eat Bugs

An interesting story is told in a dispatch from Los Angeles that says:

"Several millions of Mediterranean fruit fly parasites passed thru Los Angeles early yesterday morning on a Transcontinental and Western Air transport en route from the Hawaiian Islands to Spain. The shipment was sent by the American Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association, with headquarters in Honolulu, to national agricultural agencies of Spain through cooperation with the United States Department of Agriculture. The parasites have proven distinctly successful in the Islands, being credited with elimination of more than 50 per cent of the Mediterranean pest. They are being fostered by both government and fruit-growing officials who hope eventually to eliminate the destructive insect.

Other shipments to Spain will follow if the present experiment proves successful."

Restoring Prosperity

Only curtailment of agricultural production will restore general prosperity is the opinion of the magazine, Fruit Industries.

Whatever price level obtains when that time shall have come will depend on general credit conditions. And until natural causes—weather, insect, plant diseases—shall have brought it about, the world will have to mark time. Man seldom applies corrective measures voluntarily.

Not until the manufacturer will offer a pair of shoes for four bushels of wheat instead of accepting a proffered fifteen bushels, can there be a restoration of that economic balance we call prosperity. Not until the clothier is forced to offer a fair suit of clothes for the price of one good hog, instead of three, will business come back. Not until dealers in low-priced automobiles are compelled to offer a new car for four thousand-pound steers, instead of ten, will there be much employment in Detroit. Not until the corn canner of the North will offer to exchange thirty cases of standard corn, instead of fifteen, for a bale of cotton, will economic parity be restored. As long as agriculture gives away most of its own buying power it cannot purchase many of the products of industry.

Cellophane for Vegetables

Recently we had a little article in this column telling about using cellophane and similar wrappers to keep asparagus fresh longer and it seems that this material is gaining popularity each day as a wrapper for fruits and vegetables of all kinds.

We have read recently of Florida berry growers using a wrap that's transparent so that the berries may be inspected by purchasers, top and bottom. Among the other things now being similarly wrapped are celery hearts cauliflower rhubarb and many others.

Canary grass pasture is reducing milk production costs for Joe Kemper, Forest Grove, route No. 2. Seeded on a wet piece of land two years ago this patch of a few acres is taking care of 10 head of dairy cattle. The cows are getting no grain and are maintaining good production. Mr. Kemper sowed this in the mud as high water drained off.

Several other dairymen are finding this pasture grass valuable on land that is too wet for any other crop. On the Kemper farm this year the canary grass started growing while water was still over it. On some of the creek and river bottom lands of Washington county this grass offers good possibilities and may be irrigated if it is necessary.

Sweet clover seeded in late May on the J. A. Lindow farm, Cedar Mills, is now ready for light pasturing. This is a root-rot resistant strain developed at the experiment station at Corvallis. Seeded alone on land prepared as for alfalfa this crop may supply some pasture the first year. The second year it may be pastured back early in the season and a seed crop then harvested. The plants die following the seed production. Root-rot has been a serious limiting factor in the growing of

sweet clover in the Willamette valley. Development of a strain resistant to this fungus trouble adds another crop to those that may be grown here for seed and pasture. The new strain has not been tried locally to any extent, but shows much promise. Pasturing the first year must be done judiciously. Keeping the plant pastured back continuously will kill out some of them.

Vegetable growers remember vividly the damage done recently by the larvae of the diamond backed moth during a period of a very few days. This is practically over now but it calls to mind an economical preventative treatment for similar insect pests. Dusting with a combination of nicotine and lead arsenate will take care of both plant lice, or aphids, and chewing insects like the cabbage worm. Nicotine dust should be either used soon after being prepared or kept in tight containers.
