BIDS FOR DRILLING WELL OPENED AT COUNCIL MEETING

A. M. Jannsen Awarded Contract; City Attorney Declares Bids Illegal

Beaverton, Aug. 5.—A. M. Jannsen Drilling company was awarded the contract for drilling a test well for the City of Beaverton, at the regular council meeting Monday, August 1. Other bids received were from Carl Bros, Metzger, and R. J. Stralver, of route 3, Portland.

The resignation of city attorney Meyer was accepted by the council and through a motion of Councilman Fordney and Tabert, Mr. Meyer was given a vote of thanks for his untiring work, his hearty cooperation and loyalty to the city and its officers during his time with them.

Francis Livermore was elected to fill the recent vacancy made by the resignation of Councilman Marsh. V. P. Reimer, with the approval of the Mayor was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Mr. Meyer.

Coverage by insurance of the volunteer firemen was granted to the company represented by Doy Gray.

Recorder Richey was instructed to issue permits to the relief committee to pile wood on the city lot, for relief purposes.

C. E. Hedge brought the matter of the drinking fountain on Broadway before the council. It seems the fountain was recently broken by a truck, driver unknown. Councilman Fordney was instructed to look into the matter and make a report.

Ordinance 139 was introduced repealing ordinance 136, providing a contract with Mr. Polsky to furnish the city with water. The mayor and council were informed by the city attorney that the bids submitted for the drilling of a well were not drawn in legal form and it will be necessary to advertise again for bids.

At the adjourned meeting of the city council Wednesday a motion was made by Coun. Boswell, seconded by Mr. Alexander that all bids for drilling a well be rejected and that the city advertise for new bids. The recorder was instructed to return all checks and bonds to the bidders.

Mayor Wilson was given authority to appoint Councilman Alexander to select a man to act as special officer for a period of one month.

It was also decided that city advertise for bids for a building suitable for the fire equipment.

Motion was made to set aside \$50 to the paid out by the recorder from the general fund for the purpose of revising the present charter.

An opinion of the bonding attorneys Teal, Winifree, McCulloch Shuler, was read, stating that in their opinion the refunding bonds had been legally authorized and, a motion was made that the bonds be printed.

There was some discussion of the delinquent street assessments and the recorder was instructed to make up a list of all delinquent assessments more than 60 days past due in order that the city might take all the way from Iowa to take glands.

HERBERT HAID, ALOHA FILES AS CANDIDATE FOR COUNTY CLERK



Herbert Haid, of Aloha, has entered the political lists for county clerk in the November general election as an independent candidate. Haid is one of the first of many political aspirants expected to file as independents. His slogan, to appear opposite his name on the ballot, is "Economy and efficiency plus courtesy."

Haid has been a taxpayer and resident of Washington county since 1906, at which time he came to Orenco as auditor of the Orenco Nursery company. In 1912 he assumed duties as trustee of a large concern in Lane county for three years. Later he was employed by directors of an insurance company in Portland to direct the reorganization of the concern with the result that the insurance commissioner of Oregon re-issued a permit to the company. He then opened an office in Portland as a general public accountant which Haid believes enabled him to secure a wide and varied experience along the lines specially qualifying him for duties of the office of county clerk.

Haid was appointed receiver of the Oregon Nursery company by Judge Bagley in 1925 to look after the liquidation of that concern. Liquidation of this concern has been declared one of the most economical, efficient and courteous administrations of this character ever conducted in the state. Since winding up the affairs of the company, Haid has lived on a small tract near Aloha and declared that he has permanently cast his lot with Washington county.

In filing for county clerk he states: "I believe that there is no difference between asking the voters of Washington county for a job than there is in asking the boss of a private concern for a job, and than an employee of Washington county owes the people the same courtesy and respect that a conscientious servant should show to his employer."

"I believe that the time has arrived when the name of a political party means nothing to a voter in selecting a clerical officer. Economy, efficiency, courtesy and integrity in administration are deemed as essentials in selecting public officers. Men should be chosen for office not because of their political affiliations or at the dictatorship of political bosses."

"The employing of a county clerk of Washington county should be viewed by the voters of this county as a plain business proposition. My ability and integrity have been established by a life of service. I promise the voters courteous treatment. I emphasize courtesy by reason of the fact that the county clerk of Washington county is brought in contact with numerous people requiring service of him. If elected, every man, woman and child of Washington county having business in my office may rest assured that I will extend to each and all the utmost courtesy."

METROPOLIS NEARLY NAMED BOSTON BY FOUNDERS

Early Settlers Jeered Idea That Portland Would Become a City

Portland, Ore., Aug. 5.—Young as it is in years as compared with many other cities of the nation, Portland and the country around it is rich in history and romance.

The Willamette Valley of which Portland is the metropolis, was the goal of that brave and hardy band of men and women who started westward with their plows tied to the covered wagons made to rumble afresh by the late Emerson Hough. Many of those who made the long westward trek across the prairies over the mountains and through the vast forests of the West are still living in Portland and other sections of Oregon.

Mighty is the contrast that these early day folk see today in glancing back over the marching years to their first glimpse of Oregon.

Portland with its 301,815 people residing inside its city limits and more than 100,000 additional close around its borders, was a wilderness back in the Covered Wagon days. Canoes of the Indians, traders and trappers plied the quiet waters of the Willamette, flowing through the solitude of the forests along its shores.

Oregon City, a dozen miles above Portland, was the principal settlement on the river when the Covered Wagon folks started arriving from the East. Dr. John McLoughlin, head of the Hudson Bay company in the Oregon section had founded a post at the falls on the Willamette river at Oregon City back in 1829.

There were many who laughed at the idea of Portland's ever becoming an important city, but cities spring up at the point where headwaters of ocean navigation meet the converging trails from the hinterland. Portland was that point. Just above the city, shoal water marked a bar to deep sea navigation and still does so today. In 1844 Francis W. Pettygrove and Amos L. Lovejoy jointly owned a government land claim which was to become the site of the present city of Portland. It was timbered heavily. Lovejoy was from Massachusetts, Pettygrove from Maine. The former proposed to name their site Boston. Mr. Pettygrove held out for Portland after his own city in Maine. They tossed a coin and Pettygrove won. The boat landing on the Willamette a dozen miles below Oregon City became Portland.
