Another conference will be held in London this fall to deal with problems of exchange, embargoes, import and export quotas, tariff policies generally, credit policies and similar issues, but the United States, while formally accepting the invitation to the conference, barred any discussion of debts, reparations and tariff rates. This was done in May when Great Britain initiated the conference.

The silver problem has been included in the program in response to urgings of the Senate when Congress appropriated \$40,000 for the expense of the American delegation. By accepting the invitation the Administration passed up the suggestion of Senator Borah that war debts and reparations should be considered at the meeting, along with disarmament.

Meanwhile news from Washington tells us that the Republican high command is anxious to lure Senator Borah into active support of the party because of the tremendous following that he commands. While the Idaho senator has reiterated his statement that he "would not support Hoover" on the party platform, and insists that he doesn't "think any more of the economic plank" than "the Prohibition plank in the Republican platform," he has made it plain that he will not support the Democratic ticket and denies knowledge of a third party movement.

At the same time, the Senator insists that he will not be "dormant" and the United Press says "there are prospects that the golden-voiced Idaho senator will be out in front before the campaign is far advanced as in 1928, for the party he often has scathed but never deserted." The source of reunion is listed by this press service as the Borah proposal for an international economic conference, but this seems to be somewhat complicated in view of the definite ban on certain issues at the coming London conference.

The resignation of Robert P. Lamont as Secretary of Commerce and the selection of Roy Dikeman Chapin, of Detroit, to take his place brings to the capitol a motor car executive who expresses himself very optimistically upon the present business situation. He reports a distinct upward trend in the past thirty days, which reflects "a change in sentiment that is still taking place today."

The Imperial Conference of Ottawa continues to seek bases for favorable trade agreements between the members of the British commonwealth of nations, with increasing evidence that American trade will be seriously affected by the final commitments of the nations.

While no trade agreements have been announced by the Conference, it seems evident that the Conference will accomplish something toward creating definite preferences between the component parts of the Empire and that the chief sufferer from such arrangements will be the United States because this country has so far, the largest share of Canadian trade. However, there is nothing that this country can do or say in view of its policy of protecting its markets from world competition.

American farmers may be interested in a plan reported from Ottawa by which Premier Bennett, of Canada, hopes to sell Canadian wheat in Great Britain. While insisting that a preference for wheat in the British market is very desirable, the Canadian premier has plainly shown his intention to grant "adequate concessions for adequate concessions."

## POLICE DECLARE JACK STROM TOOK HIS OWN LIFE

**Dr. Frank Menne States Analysis of Fluid Show Traces of Poison**

Death of Jack Strom 29 at his home early Tuesday morning was a case of suicide, it was definitely decided today by Deputy Sheriff C. C. Follette of Washington county and Portland police detectives who have been working on the case. Their conclusions were based on a report by Dr. Frank Menne of the University of Oregon medical school who said analysis of fluid content in the stomach showed trace of poison.

Strom, on returning to his home on the Bertha-Beaverton highway Monday night was ill and informed his wife and Dr. Russell Welch, Beaverton, who was called, that he had been attacked by two masked men on the Portland waterfront. He said the men beat him, robbed him of \$150 and threw him over the seawall into the Willamette river. Strom claimed to have suffered a severe blow to the back of his head and body bruises. He seemed to be suffering nausea, and Dr. Welch concluded he had suffered skull fracture.

Authorities believe that Strom was despondent over the fact that he had been demoted from head tree feller to second feller for a Kelso lumber concern. He had been unemployed for some time.

He had been seeking work in Oregon since August 1, visiting Baker, Eugene and Salem.

Authorities believe he invented the robbery story to save his wife, a former Salvation Army worker whom he married eight months ago, from embarrassment. He was a hard-working man and had no bad habits, police investigation has shown.

Following Dr. Menne's report to Coroner Fred Sewell, Hillsboro, the body was released from the local county morgue.

Funeral services were held at 1 o'clock Thursday and burial was in Rose City cemetery. He leaves his widow, Irene Lillian Strom; four brothers, Alfred, Canada; John Pendleton; William California; and Ben Strom, Portland; his parents and four sisters in Sweden.

## PREMIUM LIST NOW AVAILABLE FOR 4-H CLUBS EXHIBIT

**Expense of Affair to be Handled Out of Moneys From Entertainment**

Premium lists will be sent out soon for the Washington county 4-H exhibit to be held September 16th and 17th, at the county fair grounds at Hillsboro, according to W. S. Averill, assistant county agent who says that the executive committee of the club leaders association is spending a great deal of time and effort in perfecting plans for the exhibit.

A new feature of the exhibit this year will be booths prepared by the various clubs to illustrate work done by the club during the year and knowledge gained by boys and girls through participation in their various clubs. A part of one of the buildings will be set aside for these exhibits.

Present plans are that the premium money this year will be about the same as last with a slight reduction in some divisions to provide premiums for new competition. Averill reports that clubs thruout the county are more interested in demonstration work than ever before, which will mean that boys and girls will be demonstrating their work most of the time during the two days of the exhibit. Two members constitute a demonstration team and do and tell some particular phase of their work. One member explaining the work while the other demonstrates step by step the operations involved.

Judging contests are planned for most major divisions of club work and will include cooking, sewing, livestock, poultry and rabbits. Three members constitute a judging team, and teams from each club compete for the honor of representing their division at the state fair.

Money for premiums has been provided by the county fair board but as this money can be used for premiums only it is necessary for the club leaders association to provide funds for ribbons, insurance, necessary labor, printing, and other necessary expenses.

It is the plan of the club leaders association to raise this money thru entertainments to be given each evening of the club fair. The entertainment will be held in the Schute Park auditorium and will consist of a program featuring club members and club interest followed by dancing.

Admission to the entertainment will be 25c, tickets may be purchased from club members and leaders and are good for either night of the entertainment. An entirely different program will be given each evening.

4-H club work in Washington county has increased by leaps and bounds the past few years until this year there are more than 1300 club projects with approximately 1000 different boys and girls who are interested in the success of the county 4-H club work.

It is the plan of the 4-H club leaders association that only 4-H club work be exhibited on the grounds during the two days. The idea being simply to give club members a chance to come together and to exhibit their animals and work in competition with each other.

## GRANGE HAS NO USE FOR FORD'S FOOD PLAN

**Farm Leaders are Certain It Can Only Work Out Disasterously**

A prominent subject of discussion in Grange meetings and other rural gatherings is Henry Ford's proposal that shop workers be encouraged to locate extensively in the country and go to raising their own food; as a practical means of relieving some of the living problems now pressing so heavily upon the industrial class. While a good subject for discussion is thus provided, rural sentiment is very strongly opposed to the Ford plan, and such sentiment is not at all bashful in the matter of expression.

Those best versed in practical agricultural affairs point out the difficulty of inexperienced persons making a success of any new occupation, especially one requiring so much knowledge and practical training as the raising of crops and the breeding of animals. Attention is called to the fact that 100% success on the farm is not won even by those possessing both knowledge and experience, indicating a probable hard field for those knowing nothing about how to start in farm operations or what to do next. There is general agreement in rural quarters that the Ford plan if widely adopted, can only end in disaster for most of those who embark upon it.

On the other hand, farm leaders point out, that if the plan should succeed and if thousands of shop workers find themselves able upon a small plot of land, to raise the food for family needs, then it spells disaster for the farm industry as a whole, dependent upon keeping the consumers' market for necessary food. Already the surplus of farm products constitutes the most important phase of the farm problem; and for the first time in American history the "challenge of abundance" creates the most troublesome issue for statesmen and financiers to grapple with.

The plan and its probable results has become a regularly-assigned topic for discussion in hundreds of Grange meetings this season and much valuable information is being brought out by the accompanying arguments. So far as reported Mr. Ford's ideas find little approval from Grange audiences.
