is at once deprived of his sex existence.

It is lamentable that thousands of Thyroids are being removed to-day through ignorance or blindness. But were this knowledge of the Thyroid's relation to sex generally known, what do you think would happen.

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A letter written to an internationally known teacher:

May 31 1932

"My Dear Sir:
