Hero Rewarded

Asge E. Pettersen of West Hills Post No. 656, American Legion, Multnomah, Or., has received the medal of the Purple Heart from the Secretary of War.

Mr. Pettersen saw active service at the front with Company B, 109th Infantry, 28th Division and had some very interesting experiences which caused him to be reported killed in action twice within a few days. These reports were slightly exaggerated, however.

"We were advancing toward the city of Varennes under heavy enemy shellfire," says Mr. Pettersen, "and, following our tanks, had just passed through barbed wire entanglement, when a high explosive burst a few yards above where I happened to be. A dozen men around me were killed by the fragments and I was knocked out by the concussion. When I came to I scrambled along in the general direction in which I had gone before the delay and ended up in a captured trench occupied by our troops. I walked along in this trench for awhile looking for my outfit and suddenly heard someone mention my name. A noncom was reporting to the commanding officer that I had been killed by shell fire, but I was able to convince him that he was mistaken.

"That same night we went through Varennes without very many casualties, but early next morning we were met by a terrific machine gun fire as we were advancing across an open field. Everybody flattened out where they happened to be, some men even dived into water-filled shell holes. I laid for awhile listening to the thousands of bullet-ringing by and decided then that I might as well try to spot some of the hidden machine guns. I pulled my rifle into firing position and that is where I made my mistake. The Germans spotted me immediately and the bullets near me started to get a different sound. They were not flying by, they were hitting something. As a matter of fact, they were plowing up the ground all around me and splattering me all over with mud. I soon got a little too hot and I decided that I might as well take my morning bath in a shell hole a few feet to my right. Without raising myself from the ground, I started to slide my body toward the right, but before I could follow with my legs, a bullet entered just below my left knee, went in between the bones and came out a few inches above my ankle. It sure was a lucky shot, it had come a second before it would have plowed right through my body."

PUT THE MILK PITCHER BACK ON THE TABLE

"Put the Milk Pitcher on the table" was originally a slogan used nationwide with the idea that restoring the family milk pitcher to its rightful place would help stabilizing dairy markets. But it has proven to do more than this, for it not only assures better health for the members of the family but does it more economically. Fortunately every family can afford to revive the milk drinking custom, renewal of an early American habit. Milk, noted nutrition authorities are agreed gives more food value for the money expended than any other foods. In times like these when every housewife needs to keep a watchful eye on the food budget, the milk drinking vogue at each meal is almost economical and healthful one to inaugurate.

Too often children do not want to drink milk because father or mother, older brother or sister does not have to drink it. Much can be done by example and, with the milk pitcher on the table and each one accepting his share without comment, we will do more in teaching children to enjoy milk than any other one thing.

Hand-in-hand with the re-establishing of the milk pitcher to the family table comes the revival of the vogue for milk glass, one of the first types of glass made in this country over a century and a half ago. But don't be regretful if you are unable if you are unable to humor your desire to have antique pitcher. Begin now to serve milk at the table (any kind of pitcher which holds at least one glass for each person in the family will fill the purpose) and you will be reviving a custom most important to the health and happiness of your family.

Gingerbread Gems With Apples
Mix and sift together 2 tablespoons brown sugar, 1/4 tspn baking soda, 1 cup pastry flour, 1 cup whole flour, 1/2 tspn ginger, 1 tspn cinnamon, 1/4 tspn mace and 1/2 tspn salt. Add 1/2 cup molasses, 1/2 cup melted butter and 1/4 cup raisins or currants. Then add 1 egg well beaten and 2 tbsps milk. Pare, core and cut 2 apples in eights. Grease muffin pans and place some of the apple sections in each. Pour the batter mixture over the apples and bake in a moderate oven 375 F. for about 25 minutes.

Indoor Rodeo Feature of Exposition

A thrilling indoor rodeo will be the feature of this year's Pacific International Livestock Exposition to be held in Portland, Ore., October 15-22 inclusive — the McCarty-Elliott outfit with its full string of famous bucking horses and twenty-five leading buckaroos and women riders of the country, of world championship variety. The rodeo features will be open to the world with approximately \$10,000 in prize money.

This is the same rodeo with the famous "Midnight" that doubled the receipts this year at the Denver Western Stock Show and the Fort Worth Stock Show, and held the spotlight at the Omaha Aksarben, the Cheyenne Frontier Days, and at Deadwood, South Dakota. It will be featured at eight matinee and seven evening performances, giving close-up thrills that will pack the reserved seats.

In addition to the rodeo the arena events will include the six-hand heavy draft teams, local riding

academy exhibitions and the dairy parade of winning animal exhibits. According to the president, T. B. Wilcox, Jr., the exposition as a whole will be more complete this year than in the past. Housed under one immense roof eleven acres in extent will be the usual attractive Industrial Exhibits, Dairy and Land Products Show, Beef and Dairy Cattle Show, Sheep Show; shows of hogs, goats, poultry, rabbits and dogs; and exhibits of wild life, fish and game. In many of these divisions interesting new breeds and types will be exhibited. Premiums totaling \$75,000, furnished by state, county and breeders' associations, will go to this year's winners.

Members of the Boys' and Girls' 4-H and Smith-Hughes Vocational Education Clubs are preparing for unusually fine exhibits.

Reduced fares to Portland for the Exposition, October 15-22, have been announced by all railroads.
