Prize Angel Food Cake Recipe

Sometimes ago it was reported that two Tigard ladies won high honors in the Oregonian baking contest. These two ladies are Mrs. Frank Allen, who baked the best cake, and her mother, Mrs. P. E. Lewis, who won first prize for angel food cakes. Mrs. Allen will be remembered here as Miss Ruth Lewis and formerly taught in the Tigard grade school.

Mrs. Allen says she holds no secrets about her baking, nor does Mrs. Lewis. These two prize cakes were baked from original recipes formulated by Mrs. Lewis. Here is the recipe for the cake which won the \$334 electric range:

2½ cups egg whites, 2¼ cups sugar, 1½ cups flour, 1½ teaspoons cream of tartar, 1 teaspoon of vanilla ½ teaspoon lemon, ½ teaspoon salt.

Beat egg whites with salt and cream of tartar until stiff. Add sugar gradually, beating continually. Roll in the flour gently. Add favoring last. Bake for one-half hour at 300 degrees, then for one-half hour at 325.
