TIGARD RELIEF COMMITTEE HOLDS GENERAL MEETING

New Committee Elected—Winter Program Planned.

The Tigard Central Relief committee met Friday night, October 14, at the Evangelical church. This meeting was attended by representatives of most of the local organizations.

Treasurer Arthur Vincent gave a financial report, showing approximately \$500 to have been used during the past year. Rev. E. C. Hicks gave a detailed report of Tigard relief work. Chairman Walter Uphaw reviewed the origin of the present method of handling the work, stating that this plan was not a local idea but was originated by President Hoover's non-Partisan Relief Commission and was then relayed down to state governors and thence to county judges.

He stated that his own appointment came from County Judge Templeton last fall and that this appointment was approved by a general meeting of local people at that time.

Uphaw also said that some local people seem to be under the impression that this committee had been dissolved and went on to say that while the value of handling relief work in this manner might be debatable, he did not see how Red Cross, flour and county unemployment relief work could be taken care of without some kind of a central committee. It was the opinion of the meeting that the relief work for the coming year should be continued as in the past.

It was suggested that those who felt that this difficult branch of social science could be handled without error should make application for a position on this committee.

A new committee for the coming year was elected as follows: Chairman, K. S. Tontz; treasurer, Arthur Vincent; secretary, Mrs. Pat Gooding; Rev. E. C. Hicks, Chris Christensen. The following organizations in the Tigard district have been asked to appoint one member to serve on an advisory board: Methodist church, Evangelical church, Odd Fellows, Rebekahs, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Lions Club, Hiteon Club and Grange.

Any other groups not listed are cordially invited to co-operate.

The meeting closed with a vote of thanks to the retiring committee and an expression of appreciation to Mrs. Pat Gooding for her efforts in putting on the last benefit play, which netted about \$50.

Meeting of Relief Committee

A meeting of the Tigard Central Relief Committee will be held Friday evening at the Evangelical church, at which plans for this winter's relief work will be discussed. All organizations are urged to have representatives present, as it is necessary to have full co-operation in this work. A report will be made at that time of the funds on hand including the proceeds of the play given last Friday evening.

Washington County, one of the strong Republican counties of the state, is organizing to support the President and the Republican ticket of the state and county.
