SILENTLY PASSING

November 4 marked the passing of the oldest civil war veteran residing in Beaverton, when the great commander called Alfred Davies to his last encampment. Mr. Davies was 87 only one day previous to the closing of a life of many and varied experiences. Death was due to natural causes, and at 11:30 Friday night he slipped quietly into the great beyond.

Alfred Davies was born in Elkhart, Ind., July 18, 1841. At the age of 12 years he crossed the plains with his parents and settled in the Kinton neighborhood near Beaverton. Here he grew to manhood and enlisted in the U. S. army. After the close of the civil war he served with the U. S. troops which afforded military protection to the early settlers. In 1886 he joined the Montezuma Lodge No. 50, I. O. O. F. at Hillsboro, Or., in which he retained his membership to the last. At the age of 29 he was united in marriage to Miss Mary Frances Tefft, and to this union eight children were born, W. E. Davies of Banks, Mrs. A. E. Klink of Portland, George Davies of Beaverton, Mrs. M. E. Phillips of Portland, H. A. Davies of Vancouver, Wash., Mrs. D. E. Hocken of Corvallis, Mrs. Mildred Shepard and Miss Merle Davies of Beaverton. All of the children except Mrs. Shepard survive, and were present at the funeral. Mrs. Davies preceded her husband in death in 1904, and since that time Miss Merle has kept the home for her father. Funeral services were conducted Sunday afternoon from Pegg's Undertaking Chapel, with Rev. Charles Clarke of the Congregational church officiating. Interment in the Crescent Grove cemetery. The wealth of floral offerings and the large attendance of friends at the funeral services testified the esteem in which this grand old pioneer veteran was held by his fellow men.

Mrs. Matilda Petch, aged 68 years 9 months, passed away November 6, after a prolonged illness at the home of her sister-in-law, Mrs. Cecile Hutchcroft, at Yamhill, Or. She is survived by her widower, W. R. Petch, a brother, Joseph Hutchcroft of Yamhill, and two sisters, Mrs. Bessie Butterfield of Yamhill, and Mrs. Estella Trossal of Santa Monica, Cal.

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at the Methodist church in Yamhill. 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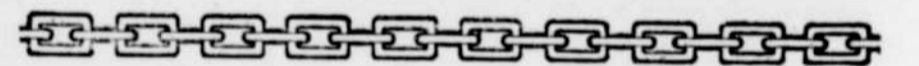


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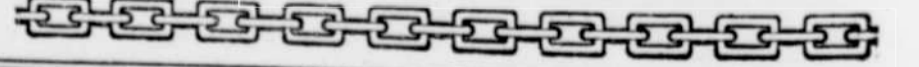
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
