"Post Farm" Shows How to Make Fence Posts Last Longer

How long will your fence posts last, five or 50 years?

Of course that depends on the kind of wood used and how it is treated or untreated.

Oregon farmers or others interested in fence building will in the future have a more accurate guide to post selection and treatment as the result of the information now being gathered on a "post farm" which has been conducted near Corvallis by the school of forestry at Oregon State college in co-operation with a number of commercial concerns.

This is a post farm, not because it produces posts, but because on it are set more than 1000 posts of 30 different woods and treatments where their durability and resistance to decay are being tested out under actual soil conditions.

The experiment was started in 1928 and already some of the posts have failed under the tests employed periodically. These tests consist of applying a pull of 50 pounds two feet above the surface of the soil. The experiment is being carried on almost without expense to the state, as much of the work of placing and testing the post is done by students in forestry, while commercial concerns are furnishing most of the materials.

Though the tests will continue to afford information for decades to come, already the plot has again shown the fallacy of trying to protect posts by charring. This only serves to weaken the wood to the extent that the fire destroys the posts and in nowise keeps out the wood decay fungus organisms. Coating posts with crank case oil is proving equally ineffective.

Practical methods of "poisoning" the wood against the action of the decay fungi are being given exhaustive tests on this post farm and it is hoped before long to give farmers of the state better direction than ever before on methods of cutting down their fencing expense.

Churches To Observe Close of Celebration

Girl Wins Chance At Trip and Scholarship

CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 17.—Miss Alice Welbes of Portland, Multnomah County, Oregon, has just been named winner in the 4-H canning project, announces the National committee on boys' and girls' club work. H. C. Seymour, state club leader of the state extension service, Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Or., was in charge of this contest.

With this award goes the privilege of competing for a trip to Chicago and for a college scholarship. These prizes are offered by Kerr Glass Manufacturing corporation, of Sand Springs, Okla., to encourage thrift and healthful foods for rural young folk.

THANKSGIVING DINNER

The modern trend in the holiday dinner is somewhat different from that of other days. In place of the elaborate dinner requiring days of preparation, we now favor the simpler type requiring less in the way of preparation and less time after in recovering from its effects. This change is partly due to a better knowledge of food values and a greater appreciation of the relation of diet to health.

The traditional wild turkey dinner has become almost impossible to carry out and the domesticated one has taken its place. However, wild fowl such as pheasant, duck or the wild goose will be the center of interest to many this year. A suggested menu is given for the Thanksgiving dinner and recipes will be sent on request to those of you who desire them.

Tomato juice cocktail
Turkey—stuffed and roasted
Creamed onions
Cured celery
Cranberry sherbert
Pear salad with grated cheese
Pumpkin pie
Milk for children
Coffee for adults
Assorted nuts.

You will notice that rolls are omitted, according to the present fashion in dinners, but if your guests like them they should be served. Butter in balls or rolls is an attractive addition to the table.

Pumpkin pie is substituted for the once-favored plum pudding and mince pie. A favorite pumpkin pie recipe is given below:

Pumpkin Pie

Beat 2 eggs, add 1 cup of pumpkin put through a sieve, and 1 1/2 cups of light cream or undiluted evaporated milk. Add the following ingredients, which have been sifted together: One tablespoon of flour, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1-3 teaspoon ginger, 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg, 1/4 teaspoon cloves, 1/2 teaspoon allspice, and 1 teaspoon cinnamon. Stir this mixture and when sugar is completely dissolved, pour into pastry-lined pie tins and bake 6 minutes at 500 degrees. Fah., then reduce heat to 300 degrees for 30 minutes.

For those who want something different in the way of pies this lemon chiffon pie is sure to please.

Lemon Chiffon Pie

Soften 1 tablespoon of gelatine in 1/4 cup of cold milk; scald 1 cup of milk in a double boiler; beat 3 egg yolks, gradually add 2-3 cup of sugar and 1/2 teaspoon salt; add the egg yolk mixture to the hot milk and continue stirring until the eggs are set. Remove from fire, add gelatine and stir until dissolved. Pour into a bowl and set in ice and water; when cool add 1/4 cup of lemon juice, mix thoroughly and fold in one cup of heavy cream, whipped. When the mixture will hold its shape, pour into a baked pastry shell. Set in refrigerator until ready to serve. Before serving spread whipped cream over the top of the pie and pipe whipped cream around the outer edge.
