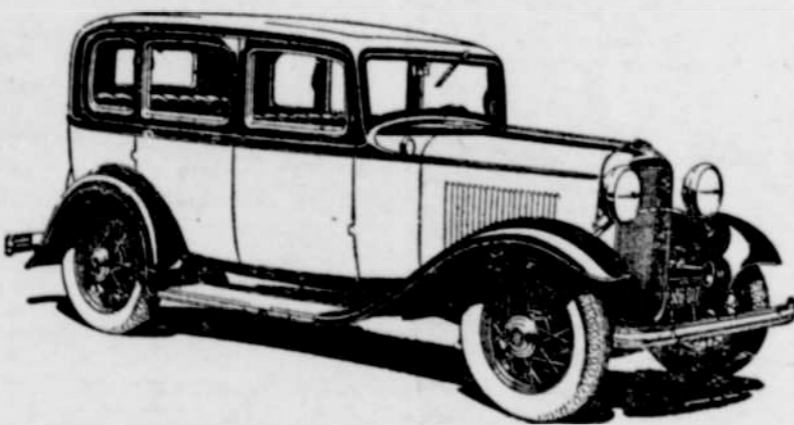
## First List of Nominations Issued Today
