Many Interesting Bills Submitted At Session

House Bill No. 9 submitted by representatives Olen, Johnson, and others, provides for doubling the present personal income tax and reducing the exemption to \$1200 for single persons and \$2200 for married persons. This bill is a compromise bill recommended by the Grange and bills are being prepared and will be submitted during the next few days.

House Bills 22 and 23 provide for the repeal of state laws relating to the market road system. The County interested in this legislation.

House Bill 30 is designed primarily for the purpose of aiding unemployed as well as owners of property who have been unable to pay their taxes. It provides for the issuance of non interest bearing warrants against delinquent taxes in lieu of property in payment of taxes of unemployed residents of the county. The bill provides that warrants shall be received by the sheriff at face value in payment of the county's share of the delinquent taxes when such warrants are accompanied by cash payment in full of the remainder of the delinquent taxes against the property being paid on.

House Bill 32 provides for the leasing of lands which have been acquired by the county and for the disposition of any funds received by the county from such leasing of said county lands.

House Bill 35 provides for a luxury sales tax upon tobacco, malt, cosmetics and similar articles classed as luxuries revenue derived from such sales tax to be in lieu of that heretofore derived from general property tax.

House Bill 36 is another general sales tax bill similar to the one defeated during the special session, except however, it provides that all home-steads within the state of Oregon shall be exempt from taxation to the extent of \$1500.

An increasing number of bills are being received daily, most of them of a technical nature providing for changes in the Code. The general attitude of the members of the House is adverse to making material changes in the law unless it is shown to be absolutely essential.

Sunday Symphony Will Feature Child Chorus

Portland, Oregon Jan. 19—The next "popular" Sunday afternoon concert to be presented by the Portland Symphony Orchestra is scheduled for January 22, at 3 o'clock, and will feature the Portland school-children's chorus of 200 voices.
