Obituary

MRS. FLORA EDITH (HERREN) BAILEY

Flora Edith Herren was born at Turner, Ore., January 17, 1867. Died at Tigard, Ore., January 22, 1933, aged 66 years and 5 days. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Levi Herren, one of the old pioneer families of Oregon, her father's family crossing the plains in 1842 and her mother's family, Mathews by name coming from Missouri in 1852 when her mother was but a child of seven years. These families settled in Marion county, Oregon. Mrs. Bailey was born on Mapledale farm near Turner where she lived till her marriage to Captain George H. Bailey September 30, 1902, then she came to Portland where her husband was on the police force, serving for sixteen years, nine of which time he was captain of the force, later being employed at the U. S. National bank of Portland.

MRS. JENNIE LARSEN

Mrs. Jennie Larsen, wife of Martin C. Larsen, prominent farmer of Cedar Mills, died Friday Jan. 20. She leaves her husband and seven children, James W. Larsen, and Mrs. Jennie Hickey of Portland, Mrs. Alice Wyss, Martin C. Jr., Nellie M. and Carl of Cedar Mills and Thos. C. Larsen of Albany Cal. She is also survived by her mother Mrs. Alice C. Otterson and 2 brothers and 5 sisters. Mrs. Larsen was a member of Leedy Grange and an active worker in the community. For a number of years her family has been prominently known for their

musical ability. Having organized an orchestra in their own immediately family they often furnished entertainment for various social affairs.

D. C. HOWARD

D. C. Howard died in a Portland hospital Monday morning after an illness of several months. He had been suffering from a nervous breakdown which was aggravated by neuritis finally terminating in sleeping sickness.

Mr. Howard was born at Salem, Ore. on January 14, 1888 moving from there with his parents to Tigard, Ore. where they resided a number of years. He was a graduate of the Oregon State College in the class of 1911 after which he was an instructor in the Dairy Department of that institution for 3 years. He then served as County Agent for Columbia Co. for 3 years and then went into the breeding of pure-bred jerseys with Ed. Carey of Carlton. Later he was interested in various phases of the dairy industry and was also one of the promoters to promote the cultivation of the Youngberry in this section.

He was affiliated with the 4H Club project in the local school also a member of the Christian church in which he was an active member.

His wife preceded him in death a little over a year ago. He is survived by his daughter Donna Rae Howard at home, his father and mother who also resided with him and 2 sisters and three brothers.

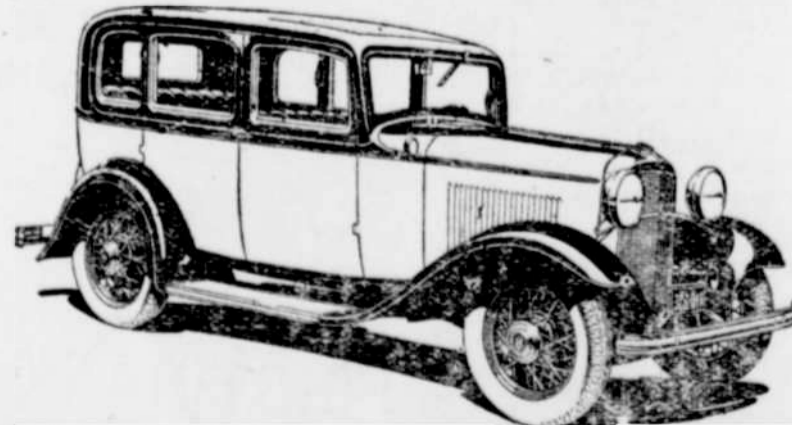
