The new transformers were installed at the well Wednesday by the Power Co. Councilman Barnes and Koshland were present. Mr. Bingham's engineer, Mr. Nelson, turned on the power. The new motor sped up to 1760 revolutions about 320 gallons per minute for a period of twenty minutes, everything seemed to work fine.

Supt. Dahl of the West Slope district, was present and conferred with the council in regard with hook up in case of emergency on either line.

Mr. Shellenberger will have charge of the construction gang on the pipe line also cleaning out Town reservoir.

Contractor W. A. Smith has been making repairs in the old valve rooms at the reservoir. Councilman Koshland reported a number of visitors at the well Wednesday.

Councilman Fordney introduced Council Resolution No. 2, the Chaplain resolution, which provides that at the regular meeting of the Council, the first Monday each month, be opened with prayer, by ministers representing the five different denominations in Beaverton. Said Resolution No. 2, was adopted by unanimous vote of the council, the resolution appears on this page.

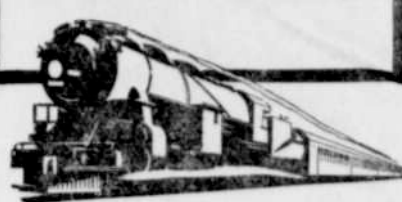
