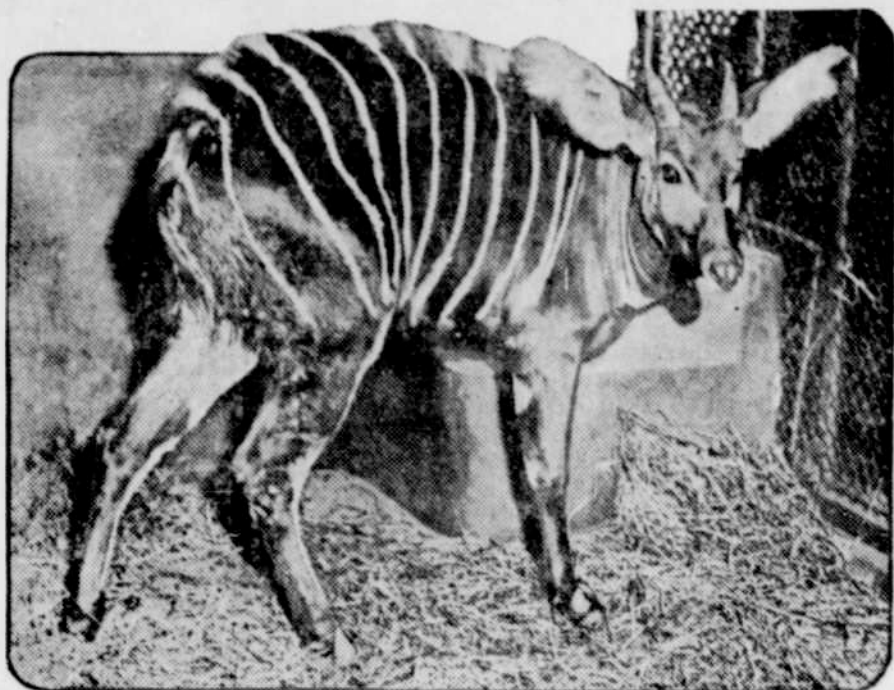


New York Zoo Gets Bongo Antelope

The "S O S" Meaning

These letters are popularly supposed to mean "Save Our Souls" or "Ship." As a matter of fact they mean nothing. The letters were selected because of their simplicity and convenience in sending. The dot and dash code is . . . — . . . (three dots, three dashes, three dots). Almost anyone could detect this signal. Prior to 1912 the initials "C. Q. D." were used.

Use for Sunflower Seeds

The seeds of the common sunflower are extensively used for poultry feed and are often fed to farm animals to improve their physical condition. The seeds are rich in fat and protein. Under pressure, sunflower seeds yield about 20 per cent oil, the higher grades of which are edible. The poorer grades are used for soap, wool dressing, paint manufacture and in certain kinds of varnish.

LAKEVIEW—A good demand for Union or Ben Beardless barley grown by Lake county farmers this last year has developed in out-of-state markets, with four leading growers here selling more than 3000 pounds for seed purposes recently. Local dealers

have bought up practically all the remaining supplies in this region and are holding it for seed purposes. This barley was originated at the Union branch experiment station as the first really successful beardless barley.

DALLAS—The effect of thinning out an old prune orchard on quality and production is being tried out this season by Knowles Brothers of the Greenwood community. This 21 year old prune orchard was originally

set out 16 by 22 feet. Now the owners are taking out every other 16-foot row, so in the future the trees will be 32 by 22 feet apart. County Agent Beck believes this treatment might be good for some hill orchards that have been going back in recent years.

How Lent's Meatless Dinners
May Be Interesting, Simple

MANY women find meatless meals much more difficult to plan and prepare than the menu in which the meat dish is the guiding star. More ingenuity is required, perhaps, to plan the meatless dinner, but when well prepared the meal is interesting and often is enjoyed more than steak, chops or roast. Suggested below are menus carefully planned to include all the essentials of a balanced meal. They produce satisfying, appetizing dinners, quite simple to prepare and especially enjoyable during the Lenten season.

Chilled Tomato Juice Crackers spread with Sandwich Relish
Casserole of Corn and Kidney Beans* Creamed Cauliflower or Cabbage
Pineapple, Celery and Nut Salad
Hot Biscuit
Jelly Roll* Coffee

Salmon and Corn Patties* Cooked Spaghetti in Tomato Sauce (Ready to Serve)
Cold Slaw with Chopped Pickle or Mixed Fruit Salad
Baked Apple Dumplings with Top Milk or Cream Coffee

(* Indicates recipes are given below.

Jelly Roll: Beat 3 eggs, add one cup sugar gradually, add 4 tablespoons cold water, and sift in 1 cup flour, scant, 1/4 teaspoon salt, and 1/2 teaspoon baking powder. Put in pan about 8" by 11" lined with wax paper, and bake in oven at 375° F. for 15 minutes. When done, turn out on clean towel which has been sprinkled with powdered sugar. Trim crisp outside crusts, spread with Currant Jelly, or Cherry or Red Raspberry Preserves, and roll while hot. Wrap in towel and allow to stand until cold. Slice and serve with whipped cream, if desired.

Casserole of Corn and Kidney Beans: Mix one medium can Oven Baked Red Kidney Beans, one med-

ium can Corn, 1 green pepper, minced finely, 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1 egg well beaten. Pour into buttered baking dish, sprinkle top with 3 tablespoons grated cheese, and layer of fine, buttered bread crumbs; then bake in a moderate oven for 30 to 45 minutes.

Salmon and Corn Patties: Flake one 1-lb. can of salmon and add 1/2 can of corn, (or 1 cup corn) 1/4 cup Tomato Ketchup, 2 to 3 tablespoons flour, 2 eggs, well beaten, and 1 teaspoon salt. Drop by heaping tablespoons in a skillet, the bottom of which is well covered with hot fat. Fry to a golden brown, turn and when both sides are nicely browned, serve hot, as main course for luncheon or supper.

The two daughters which have completed official records are Gertrude of Rainier View 231973 with a production of 9604.3 pounds of milk and 500.3 pounds of View 185102 with a production of 12590.9 pounds of milk and 590.5 pounds of fat in class A.

The only way man can beat machines in the live stock industry is in the use of brain in applying knowledge gained for him and by him through study and observation.

Technocracy is nothing for the intelligent man to fear, in fact adapting the discoveries of the technocrats to his own use will undoubtedly increase the earning ability of the live stock breeder who thinks.

Who can go into the hop business with a reasonable prospect of success under the apparent advantage of present price stimulation? E. N. Bressman, crops specialist at Oregon State college, after pointing out the ups and downs of the business through several decades, sums it up in this manner:

"Anyone really familiar with hop growing who has excellent river bottom land well adapted to producing 2000 pounds of dry hops per acre, and who is well equipped and willing to combat threatening outbreaks of downy mildew disease in spring and at picking time, and who possibly can obtain a good contract at 20 cents a pound over several years, has a good opportunity. If any of these essentials are missing he had better stay out."
