CLAIMS RETARDED MONEY
CIRCULATION CAUSE
OF DEPRESSION

To the Editor:

It is generally conceded that our present economic disorder is caused by retarded circulation of money, it is also agreed that hoarded money is responsible for the lack of money in circulation. The solution of our problem then is in finding a remedy.

Following is a plan which I have advocated for some time, and which I have submitted to a large number of people including our representatives at Washington without receiving a single reason why it is not practical and effective.

The plan is simply this: Compel every one who is hiding cash to dig it up and help pay the running expenses of our country out of it. In other words pay taxes on it just the same as we are compelled to pay taxes on other property. You will no doubt agree that would be just fine, but you will immediately ask HOW? Very simple, not so very long ago our treasurer decided to change the size of our money and it wasn't much trouble for him to issue a new batch at the expense of the tax payer, why not issue a new batch once a year and declare the old issue subject to taxes until it is exchanged for the new issue. The year date could be plainly printed on each issue so it would reveal the number of years taxes it was subject to whenever the holder got ready to use it.

Anyone having money on deposit in banks would not have to pay taxes on the full amount of their balance because the bank could only charge to the depositors the amount of taxes the bank paid pro rata, therefore it is obvious that this would not hit them as hard as it would the miser who keeps his money out of circulation altogether. This plan is so clear and comprehensive that it is quite apparent that the only reason that it has not been put in operation are either one of two

things. It has not been thought of by our law making body at Washington or else they belong to the class that would oppose it.

I would advocate this remedy in the same spirit that I would lend assistance to any one in distress whether it was to my own disadvantage or not. The only person antagonistic to such a law would necessarily be either miserly and selfish or unable to analyze the plan properly, or erroneously influenced by such a person.

My purpose in persistently repeating my solution of this situation is only in the hope that it will eventually dawn on sufficient influential persons who are in position to bring it into maturity and thereby perform an act of humanity to the thousands now in distress all on account of this evil.
