The American Navy

During the four Hoover years Congress authorized no new naval construction. This is particularly interesting in view of the fact that it was the Harding Republican administration which scrapped the great naval building program of the Wilson administration. Through three Republican administrations the American Navy has been allowed to grow weaker comparatively to the navies of Great Britain and Japan.

The appointment of Senator Claude A. Swanson as Secretary of the Navy is encouraging to the navy because he has been generally regarded as a big-navy-man. The need for such a champion can be realized by the fact that during the last ten years both Great Britain and Japan have outbuilt the United States in number of ships; the figures are: United States 40, Britain 147, and Japan 164. In tonnage: United 197,640, Britain 473,331, and Japan 409,667.

Speaking to the House of Representatives recently Chairman Carl Vinson of the House Naval Affairs Committee, said: "If the United States Navy is to be able to support American policies, protect American trade and defend American possessions it must be provided with new aircraft carriers, new light cruisers, new destroyers and new submarines. . . . The international situation today is far from reassuring. . . . We stand practically alone and friendless in a turbulent world. . . . This is no time to scuttle the Navy and jeopardize the safety of the United States. The income from tobacco taxes would build and maintain a Navy such as we need, with ease."

The United States does not attempt to maintain a great standing army, but it should maintain a navy second to none in the whole world. Its ships should be modern and the equal of those in other navies. We should not allow a condition to approach whereby this great country might call upon its sailors to oppose an enemy with obsolete and antiquated boats.

COMMITTEE GUIDES GARDEN PROJECTS

Statewide Campaign Launched to Further Vegetable Growing by Oregon Unemployed

A greater campaign, competently directed, for subsistence gardens thru out Oregon by which unemployed may produce much of their necessary food by their own efforts, is underway this season thru the cooperation of the relief council of the state with the Oregon State college extension service.

A state subsistence garden committee has been appointed and it has just issued 10,000 copies of a new leaflet which contains planting plans and other information for guiding the inexperienced gardener in producing a score or more different vegetables on a plot 60x100 feet.

Each county agent in the 28 counties maintaining them is prepared to give local assistance and advice in adapting the recommendations contained in this new leaflet to the particular conditions prevailing in each county.

While free seed and free fertilizer in some instances, are being provided under the terms of money granted by the Reconstruction Finance corporation, strict rules have been issued to prevent the abuse of this privilege thru issuing seed to other than duly registered unemployed persons.

"R. F. C. funds are made available for seeds and fertilizers with the expectation that local agencies, public and private, will cooperate in such matters as making suitable garden tracts, tools and equipment available, and providing irrigation water when possible. Only persons 'willing and able' to grow gardens are encouraged to do so. As unemployed persons receiving relief are not able to purchase adequate quantities of vegetables, subsistence gardens will not compete to any considerable extent with farmers and truck gardeners who have produce for sale."

Members of the state subsistence committee are W. L. Teutsch, assistant state county leader; A. G. B. Bouquet, professor of vegetable crops; Lucy A. Case, nutrition specialist of the extension service; O. S. Fletcher, county agent of Lane county, and J. J. Inskip, county agent of Clackamas county.

Sea Shell "Lime" Available

MARSHFIELD — Distribution of ground sea shells to southwestern Oregon farmers for use as agricultural lime is again assured through action at the annual meeting of the Coos Bay Lime and Fertilizer association, a cooperative concern formed last year. Membership fee for farmers has been reduced to 20 cents a year and the price of the ground shell set at \$5 a ton which is far cheaper than agricultural lime shipped in. County Agent Jenkins reports that the ground shell is entirely satisfactory for use in this district and is the most economical material available. Shells are dredged from Coos bay and ground to powder.
