Latest Reports on Water Tests of New System Re- ceived Wednesday

Call meeting Town Council Wednesday night. Roll call present Barnes, Bishop, Boswell, Fordney and Koshland councilmen, Mayor Fisher, recorder Smith, town attorney Reimer and chief of police Peets.

Report State Board of Health on water Town well shows water improving rapidly for a new well—the best report received to date—further pumping and testing operations will continue.

The "Hoover Hotel" will be supplied with another cord of wood to help the unfortunates keep warm.

Resolution passed to provide adequate funds for maintenance Town police department on efficiency basis was adopted.

The proposition of 3.2 per cent beer to be sold in corporate limits of Beaverton was thoroughly discussed—a number of business men were present and stated their views on the beer question—among those who spoke were C. J. Beach, Mr. Boyd, Albert Rossi, and Mr. Mapes. Councilman Bishop presented clippings stating action proposed by Hillsboro City officials.

Councilman Koshland presented a list of license rates that seemed to be fair by those present—taken all in all—the question seems to be—shall the Town regulate the beer proposition or the beer proposition regulate the Town—the Council decided to authorize Mr. Reimer to draw up an ordinance to handle the situation in a manner that will be fair to local business men and safeguard the best interests of the Town.

SCAVANGER ACT PASSES BEAVERTON CITY COUNCIL

Meeting Opened with Prayer, First Time Monday Evening

Regular session of the Town Council was held Monday evening. Present were Councilmen Barnes, Bishop, Boswell, Fordney, Koshland and Livermore, Mayor Fisher, recorder Smith town attorney Reimer and chief of police Peets.

For the first time prayer was offered at a session of the Town Council by Rev. Willard P. Anderson of the First Church of the Nazarene.

U. P. Reimer was appointed Town attorney by Mayor Fisher, his appointment was ratified by the Council. The vote was Yeas 4, Bishop, Boswell, Fordney, Koshland, Nays, 2 Barnes, Livermore.

Resolution was passed unanimously recommending the Boys League of Beaverton for offering their co-operation in keeping the streets of our town free from waste paper—a splendid spirit for their organization.

A new Town charter will be drafted in the near future—to cope with modern conditions of a growing community.

Mr. Unis of Beaverton Electric, made a report on red light for state police.

Ordinance No. 143, the Scavenger Act regulating disposal of garbage in corporate limits was passed without opposition, copy of said ordinance appears in this issue of the Enterprise.

The light contract was laid on the table.

Boswell recommended that protection in shape of barricades be placed in a certain strip of sidewalk on Watson street, South, recommendation was adopted.

Dewey Drorbaugh requested action on needed improvements on Short street, according to agreement when said street was widened several years ago. Bishop, chairman of streets will have supervision of the work.

Mrs. Rosa Merlow's request for street light at North town limits on Cedar street was referred to Barnes, chairman of lights.

Mr. Goyt, Supt. Water Dept. made report on operations pipe line along Canyon road—the general trend is that everything is moving along and that within a short time the well water will be in the Town mains—which will mean more water for the same money for Beaverton water consumers.

ADMINISTRATION PLAN CONSOLIDATION OF LARGE RAILROADS

Reduction of Federal Salaries 15 per cent Effective April 1

It is reported that the Administration's plan for the railroad of the country include the consolidation of the various carriers into a limited number of systems. There would probably be two in the East, headed by the New York Central and the Pennsylvania respectively, with two other systems in the South, and probably three in the West.

Bondholders and laborers would fare better than stockholders, whose interests are secondary, but many employees would be thrown out of work. In such an event, it is possible that some pensioning of workers would be undertaken in a form similar to that adopted in Great Britain following a period of amalgamation.

The fact that the large carriers have been unable to meet their interest charges without government aid, and that many of them owe large sums to the Reconstruction Finance Corporation would practically compel agreement by stockholders. Railroads, it is said, have failed to take advantage of the recent amendment to the bankruptcy act which made possible a reduction of top-heavy capital structures.

As an alternative to wholesale consolidation, there has been suggested a Federal supervisor of railways. The idea is backed by those who believe it will take care, so far as possible, of the interests of stockholders and junior security holders.

President Roosevelt, in beginning his governmental reorganization program, has consolidated the Federal organization which deal primarily with agricultural credit into one agency, the Farm Credit Administration, at a saving estimated at more than \$2,000,000 annually. The plan goes into effect on May 27th unless disapproved by Congress prior to that time. The executive order marks the end of the Farm Board and stops the stabilization activities, which, it is estimated, have cost the government \$300,000,000. Stocks of grain and cotton held by government agencies will be taken over by the Red Cross at a saving of nearly \$2,000,000 to the government.

This consolidation of agricultural agencies into one establishment involves about 10,000 workers and will mean the elimination of duplicated effort. When it goes into effect, the farmer who wants credit will deal with one agency, regardless of whether one wishes to secure a crop loan, money for the payment of interest and taxes, or assistance in the refinancing of his mortgage.

While the exact details have not yet been outlined, President Roosevelt in his message to Congress, pointed out that the controlling purpose of his act was "to maintain and strengthen a permanent system of cooperative agricultural credit." Henry Morgenthau, Jr., who will be Governor of the new Farm Credit Administration, insists that the government will expect "to be repaid for all loans advanced."

Another economy move was the President's order reducing salaries of Federal officers and workers fifteen per cent, effective April 1st. As these wages were reduced eight and one-third per cent during the Hoover administration, the new order is actually six and one-third per cent off. The reduction will be general through out the entire government which has a \$1,200,000,000 annual payroll, affecting congressmen, as well as enlisted men and officers. It is based upon the lower cost of living which, it is estimated is about 21.7 per cent below that of 1923.

Conversations with British and French representatives indicate that the war debt question is not being overlooked by the Administration during the domestic emergency. It seems plain that the United States and Great Britain will carry on extensive negotiations on the world's economic situation.
