ORDINANCE NO. 143

AN ORDINANCE regulating the collection and transportation and or delivery within the Town of Beaverton to the Town Dump, and or the transportation and delivery to the Town dump of garbage or rubbish collected outside of the Town, providing for the issuance of a license to scavengers and fees for dumpage, prescribing a penalty for violation thereof, and declaring an emergency. THE PEOPLE OF THE TOWN OF

BEAVERTON DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS: Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any scavenger or rubbish collector or for any other person to transport in or thru the town of Beaverton any garbage or other refuse matter collected or procured within the town limits of Beaverton, without complying with the following regulations and securing a license so to do.

Any scavenger or rubbish collector, and or transport within the town of Beaverton, any garbage and or rubbish for disposal at the town dump or elsewhere, shall first make application for a license, said application to be made to the town council. Should the application be approved, the town recorder shall issue a license. The amount of said license shall be Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) per annum, payable in advance.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any scavenger or rubbish collector or any other person to dump garbage or refuse of any kind whatsoever in the Town dump, without complying with the following regulations.

Any scavenger or rubbish collector or any transporter of garbage, refuse or rubbish not transporting garbage, refuse or rubbish through the streets of Beaverton, but wishing to use the Town dump for disposal of said garbage, refuse and or rubbish shall first make application to the town recorder for a license so to do, and if application be approved then the license shall issue. The said license fee shall be One Dollar (\$1.00) for each and every truck load of garbage, refuse and or rubbish, said truck load not to exceed in weight 2000 pounds. A license shall issue for each and every load, and to be paid in advance.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person to carry any garbage, refuse, filth and or rubbish along any street or sidewalk, or to transport any garbage, filth, refuse and or rubbish except in a tin, covered vehicle, or apparatus. Said tin, covered vehicle or apparatus to be so constructed and so covered so as to prevent any leakage or spillage into the street or on to the sidewalk, or to be exposed to the open air during transportation.

Section 4. Any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof in the municipal court, be punished by a fine not to exceed One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) or by imprisonment of thirty days in jail or both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 5. Inasmuch as this ordinance is necessary for the immediate preservation of the peace, health and safety of the town of Beaverton in this: That garbage and refuse matter is now being dumped into the town dump from points outside the town, and for which no revenue is being received, and that garbage and refuse matter is being collected and transported without regulation, and that there is no ordinance to cover said collection, dumpage or transportation, therefore, an emergency is declared to exist, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect after its passage by the council, and its approval by the Mayor.

Passed by the council this third day of April, 1933.

GARDEN TALKS

By Winifred G. Mikacke

Our season has been a bit backward this season and some of us are getting rather anxious to get out and "dig". My advice is to bide your time. When soil is in a condition such as it is now, as a result of our continued wet spell, it is folly to work ground and plant seeds that were intended by Nature to be grown in soils that had reached the proper condition thru the proper temperature to germinate seed placed in it, will be a source of regret. So I say until your soil works loosely, turns over and becomes pliable with little or no smashing of clods, do not plant seeds and expect results that will please you.

Many people every year make this mistake and usually if good returns are not the results of this untimely and wasted effort on their part, the seedman from whom the purchase was made is excoriated and falsely blamed for results that are not to his liking either.

Of course I might say that there are a few seedsmen who are unscrupulous and purposely talk people into making a planting of early vegetables or flowers, when they know well enough that these people are doomed to failure and will be back to make a second purchase, to replant seeds sown in ground that was too wet and cold rather than making the seed germinate producing a crop to the purchasers entire satisfaction, produces nothing more than an aching back, sore muscles together with an aggravated case of "lost Faith" in every seedman.

So again, if you will accept my advice, don't be in a big hurry to plant your vegetables or flower seeds. Wait until the soil has dried sufficiently to allow easy working and is warmed to the stage of where tender annual weeds are making a rapid growth, which is always a good indication that Nature is active and it is time for you to start gardening.

Another good indication to follow in preparation of your seed bed, is never to work or plant in soils that will stick to your hoe or spade in the preparation of the seed bed.

SPRING MENUS FEATURE FRUIT AND LAMB

THIS is an excellent time of year to think about adding something to pep up our appetites and introducing something that savors of spring to our diets. One good way to start is to eliminate hot, especially cream, soup every other night and substitute a fruit cocktail or appetizer of some kind. Then, since spring lamb will soon be at its best, you will be serving it quite frequently and would probably like to know of some interesting ways to use it up the second or third day. Therefore, you will find below some recipes for appetizers and left-over lamb which should add double cheer to your meal planning now—from the economy standpoint and for the touch of spring that does us all good after a long dose of winter.

Melon Cup

Cantaloupe, honey dew or casaba melon, cut in cubes, mixed with halved maraschino cherries, lemon juice squeezed over them, sugar added to taste. Chill thoroughly in gas refrigerator and serve in fruit cocktail glasses.

Southern Cup

Chilled grapefruit sections, combined with long, thin sections of canned pears, sprinkled with chopped green menthe cherries. Chill, and just before serving pour over the top a little of the menthe.

Minted Grapefruit Cocktail

Cut a grapefruit in half and loosen the pulp from the rind and partitions, using a sharp knife. Do not cut out the center, but remove all the seeds. Cut over every fourth section of grapefruit and replace it with a wedge-shaped slice of mint jelly. Sprinkle with sugar and chill thoroughly in gas refrigerator.

Tomato Supreme

Six very small tomatoes, 1/4 cake cream cheese, 2 tablespoons cream, 1 tablespoon Chili sauce, 1 tablespoon catsup, 1/4 teaspoon paprika, salt, pepper.

Scald tomatoes, remove skin and centers, sprinkle inside of tomato with salt, and chill in cabinet of gas refrigerator. Mix cheese, cream, Chili sauce, catsup, paprika, salt and pepper together into a thick, smooth cream. Fill the tomatoes with this mixture and return to refrigerator until ready to serve. Top with mayonnaise dressing.

Serve on a small leaf of lettuce or on shredded lettuce as the first course of luncheon or dinner.

Lamb Roll

Mined lamb, biscuit dough, gravy or white sauce.

Make a batch of biscuit dough and roll it out to thickness of about one-half inch. Mix the lamb with enough gravy or medium thick white sauce to moisten it well, and taste to see if it needs any seasoning. A dash of Worcestershire sauce, a minced onion or a little more salt will give the meat mixture an extra dash of flavor. Spread the meat mixture on the dough and roll up like a jelly roll. Place in greased pan and bake in gas oven at moderate heat until dough is a golden brown. Serve, cut in slices, and cover with more gravy or with a medium white sauce to which a few chopped cooked mushrooms have been added. You do not need potatoes with this dish. Also, any other meat may be substituted for lamb.

Lamb Pilaf

Cooked rice, fresh tomatoes, small minced onion, chopped lamb, gravy or thin white sauce, buttered crumbs.

Mix the rice with the onion, chopped meat and gravy or white sauce and taste. Add seasoning if needed. The mixture should be quite moist. Put a layer in a baking dish and add a layer of thinly sliced tomatoes, another layer of rice, the rest of the sliced tomatoes and a top layer of rice mixture. Cover with buttered crumbs and bake in gas range oven, moderately hot, until the crumbs are browned. Buttered beets are a good vegetable to serve with this dish.

Lamb Casserole

Cut lamb in small pieces. Put lamb and macaroni in layers in a greased casserole. Pour thin gravy or thin white sauce over the top layer and cover with bread crumbs. Bake in a hot oven 20 minutes or until crumbs are brown.

Curried Lamb

Cut lamb in one-inch cubes. Reheat in the lamb gravy to which a little curry powder has been added.
