ADMINISTRATION PLANS CONSOLIDATION OF LARGE RAILROADS

(4) greater freedom of international trade.

The British willingness to discuss these economic questions is due to a realization that the Roosevelt administration will not readjust debts without mutually advantageous agreements on other questions. Moreover, the technical suspension of the gold standard in this country threatens a chaotic international situation which might force Great Britain to the gold standard prematurely, which, in their eyes, would be a disadvantage.

Additional efforts to take care of the unemployment situation included a \$500,000,000 relief fund which, it is expected, will be in the form of a direct grant to the states, although part of it may be expended in the form of loans. In addition, a huge public works program, running about \$1,000,000,000 and liberalization of the law to enable the R. F. C. to make constructive loans to states and subdivisions are included in the program.

The Administration farm relief bill, after quick passage through the House, ran into Senate opposition, and a re-written bill was submitted to the Senate last week. Passage of the relief measure by the Senate will send it to conference, and final congressional action ought to be completed about the time this is read. Senate hearings brought forth conflicting opinions, with many ideas suggested. However, the urgency of the farm situation and the fact that planting of the 1933 crops is underway indicate that the pressure of opinion will force the enactment of some measure. At best, all of the proposals are untried and largely experimental.

According to a report of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, it loaned \$2,083,750,079 from February 2, 1932, until March 21, 1933. Banks borrowed \$1,013,020,039 and repaid \$307,243,965. Loans to 62 railroads aggregated \$359,885,015, of which \$20,175,984 was repaid. Self-liquidating projects, including agreements to advance funds, amounted to more than \$205,000,000. Relief to 40 states and two territories took \$186,395,683. Loans to 507,632 farmers required \$64,204,503, an average of \$126.48 per farmer. Financial institutions, other than banks, included \$109,373,156 to building and loan associations, \$958,173,337 to insurance companies, and \$133,358,036 to mortgage loan companies. Land bank and joint stock companies received about \$60,000,000.

A Great Gathering of the Farm People

One of the most noteworthy conventions of 1933 will be the annual gathering of the National Grange, scheduled for Boise, Idaho, November 15-24, which will bring together a representing at least 32 different states and covering the entire width of the continent.

One of the reasons for selecting Boise as the 1933 meeting-place of the National Grange is the fact that the state of Idaho has been coming forward very rapidly in Grange organization the last five years and is one of the most wide-awake state units the Grange has. With the impetus which holding this big session at Boise will create, the present season is expected to see large numbers of new subordinate Granges organized in Idaho and a great accession to its membership.
The National Grange has an interesting custom of carrying its annual session each year to points all over the United States, so as to create interest in the various sections. Last year the convention was held at Winston-Salem, North Carolina, the year before at Madison, Wisconsin, and it is expected that the 1934 session will be located somewhere in New England. These Grange conventions always bring together great crowds of people, reaching nearly 20,000 at Rochester, New York, in 1930. At the Boise session it is expected that a class of at least 3,000 members will receive the highest degree conferred by the Grange and the various business organizations of that city are making elaborate plans for Grange entertainment.
