

Local High School Band to Compete at Eugene

Beaverton High School has entered its band in the tenth annual Oregon State high school band contest to be held on the campus of the University of Oregon April 14 and 15, and is expected to be a strong contender for the championship of the state.

In all, more than 700 students will be guests of the university for the contest and plans are being made for their entertainment both by students and by townspeople.

Bands will compete in three classes. Class A will include schools over 600, Class B those from 400 to 600, and Class C under 400.

Each band will be required to play one selective number and one required number. They are first allowed a "warm-up" march which will not be judged.

Judges will be Glenn H. Woods, supervisor of music, Oakland, California public schools; Frank Mancini, director of bands, Modesto Junior College, and L. A. McArthur, supervisor of music, Willows, Calif.

Commenting on the administration bill as compared to the Frazier measure Representative Mott pointed out that the features of the Frazier bill embodied real relief to the stricken farmer.

Drunken Drivers Must Answer to Secretary of State in Future

Reckless and drunken automobile drivers will be under closer scrutiny of state officials after June 9th, as a result of changes made by the state legislature in the operator's code.

Every person convicted of operating a motor vehicle because of incompetency, driving while intoxicated, recklessness and hit and run drivers regardless of the court having jurisdiction in the matter, will be reported immediately to the Secretary of State for appropriate action.

The fact that each municipal judge, or city recorder, is forced to make a report of all serious traffic violations upon which convictions have been recorded, will practically double the effectiveness of the curb on outlaw operators.

The suspension or revocation of drivers licenses is the new provision in the law requiring each convicting magistrate to immediately take up the license of those found guilty of serious offenses and forward the cards to the state department.
