COUNTY AGENT NOTES

The scarcity of hay and the high price that must be paid for it when purchased is causing many dairymen to consider ways of conserving their next winter's hay where they can do so and still maintain a good milk flow. As a solution of their problem, corn silage comes in as a crop that was not hurt by the winter and which can be planted late.

Several experiment stations have carried on work to determine the relative value to dairy cows of hay and corn silage. From these trials it is safe to assume that 250-300 pounds of good corn silage is worth as much for feed as 100 pounds of good alfalfa hay, or expressed in tons, 2 1/2 to 3 tons of corn silage is the equivalent for feeding dairy cattle of 1 ton of alfalfa hay. Of course the silage would be worth a little more as compared to grain hay. Silage from corn cut at the glazing or dent stage is more valuable than that from more immature corn, having more food value, pound for pound.

Several dairymen in this county have built wooden-hoop silos which have proven very satisfactory. Such silos can now be built with the cost of materials running at a dollar or a trifle more per ton capacity. With the present price outlook for hay as it is, some dairymen are planning to build a silo and plant enough corn to fill it. Where their hay will not carry them through, this plan has considerable merit.

The two most common all wood silos are the Re-saw and the Wooden-hoop types. Plans and cost estimates for building either of these silos are available at the county agent's office.

HI-WAYS TO HEALTH by ADA R. MAYNE OREGON DAIRY COUNCIL

MAY DAY AND

CHILD HEALTH

May Day now means Child Health Day to most everyone. That each child may have essential food elements in each day's diet is one of the five principal items in the general purpose of May Day as Child Health Day, in accordance with the Children's Charter, which grew out of the White House Conference on Child Health and Protection.

The health of children can be measured to a great extent by the foods given them. Lack of food, or the wrong type of food in the diet, is more injurious to the child than to the adult, because the child is growing and his food, while serving his present needs, must also build for the future.

Children must not only have food enough but must be supplied with the essential food elements, in order to grow normally and to have strong, and healthy bodies.

Milk is the most important single food in the diet of the child. They should have plenty of it. Nutritionists have watched the growth of different groups of children, who were all on the same diet, except that some had more milk than others, or where poor home diets were supplemented by the giving of milk at school. In every case the children who had the most milk outgrew the others in weight and height, where children had the supplementary milk feeding during school hours, almost unbelievable gains in weight and general

physical conditions were made. If there is difficulty in getting the child to drink enough milk, give it to him cooked with his cereal or as creamed vegetables or soup, custards and the like.

Although milk is indispensable in the child's diet, a variety of foods or the balanced diet is recommended, even for the baby. According to our best food scientists, begin early to give children milk, cereals, tomato or orange juice, vegetables and fruits, eggs and some meat, being sure, of course, that they are suitably prepared. Some cod liver oil should be provided for the child under two, and if possible for the older child too.

The recipe this week can be used in a menu which is planned to meet the needs of all the family who are above the age of two.

Liver Casserole

2 potatoes, 2 carrots, 2 cups English peas, 1 diced onion, 6 tablespoons butter, 3 tablespoons flour, 2 cups milk, 2 teaspoons salt, 1-2 teaspoon pepper. Cook potatoes until slightly tender with the carrots, then cut in cubes. Cook with the peas. Wipe liver, slice, flour and brown in butter. Remove and cut in cubes. Brown the onion in butter and remove. Make a gravy with 6 tablespoons butter, flour and milk. Arrange a layer of vegetables, then a layer of liver in casserole. Repeat and add salt and pepper. Four gravy over this and bake in a moderate oven 1 hour. This is especially good for children because it combines vegetables with the liver.

Two Irrigation Systems Built

WILLAMINA—Two gravity farm irrigation systems are being installed this spring on the Wise and Mendenhall places along the Willamina river. On the Wise place the water will be taken out high up in the hills and will be flumed about 2000 feet and then run in an open ditch to a 48-

acre field. The county agent has pronounced this one of the most feasible project in the county. Mr. Mendenhall is also building a gravity system taking the water from a small creek tributary to the Willamina river at almost no cash cost to irrigate about 15 acres.

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
