W. E. UPSHAW EXPLAINS 1933 PRODUCE ACT

dealers in Portland will pay a license fee of \$100.00. Outside of Portland, they will pay a \$25.00 fee.

Wholesale peddlers with loads of more than one ton, will pay a \$100 license fee for operating anywhere in the state.

This fee is high enough to give the peddlers some interest in our market.

kets and will eliminate some of the occasional dumpers, but it is not high enough to work a hardship upon those reliable peddlers who are a necessary link in the distributing chain. Brokers, commission merchants, and credit buyers will pay a \$25.00 license.

In the past men posing as cash buyers of farm produce have bilked the Oregon growers out of thousands of dollars. This type of dealer, who is of course greatly in the minority, will now find Oregon a tough place to operate.

The Department of Agriculture now has the authority to revoke buyer's license for such practices, and to hold an informal court in which findings are made. In case proper settlement is not forthcoming these findings are turned over to the Circuit Court of Marion county.

Three-fourths of the provisions of the act are in the interest of fair and square dealings between grower and handler. The other fourth in the license part, which makes the whole program possible.

Farmers are urged to insist upon a buyer's identification card, and in case of dispute they are asked to file a complaint with W. E. Upshaw, Field Representative Division of Market Enforcement, Salem, Oregon.

California has had a similar law in effect for some time and growers and shippers alike are enthusiastic in their praise.

The support which this Bill receives in Oregon, which includes farmers, merchants, dealers, and the more reliable type of peddlers, indicates that Oregon will no longer be the dumping ground for the Pacific Coast.
