No one would have supposed a few months ago that weather conditions during the early spring would prevent the seeding of necessary crops that could be used for hay purposes to replace the vetch, oats and clover that were killed out by severe winter weather. Some vetch and oats, Canada field peas with oats, and oats alone, have been seeded but the hay problem has not all been solved as yet. Where red clover had the protection of a good heavy stubble most of it stood and is coming along nicely. This late in the season it is necessary to consider some crops for hay purposes that ordinarily would not be given any thought. In addition to hay crops, farmers are planning on getting in all the other kinds of forage crops that may be used to decrease the amount of hay that will be required.

More corn and turnips will help out on many dairy farms. Additional corn may mean more silo space and in some instances this may be a good investment. Some dairymen object to handling the turnips because of the disagreeable weather during much of the season when they have to be gotten out of the field. Liberal feedings of turnips will usually decrease considerably the amount of hay cows consume and to some extent the amount of grain required. Millet, soy beans and sudan grass are hay possibilities that may be planted after this date and even into June with fair possibilities of respectable yields.

Sudan grass offers some promise for pasture as well as for hay. It is not an early season crop and some seedlings that have already been made look like they would need to be reseeded. This crop should be seeded on a well prepared seed bed at the rate of 20 to 25 pounds of seed per acre. Of the millets there is but one type to be considered for hay planting here; this is the foxtail type. There are three types of millet. One of these is the proso or seed type; another is the Japanese barnyard millet which is grown more or less on the coast sections but is not the kind to grow in the Willamette valley for hay. Of the foxtail type there are two or three varieties that offer more promise than some of the others. Hungarian and Kursch are two good ones for local planting. Siberian and German are two other desirable varieties but not as preferable as the first two named.

Millet is seeded at the rate of 20 to 25 pounds per acre on a seed bed that is prepared somewhat like that for clover or alfalfa. Yields will depend upon the fertility of the land and upon the amount of moisture that is available for the crop during the summer. There are small plantings of millet in the county nearly every year and those having experience with it are of the opinion that it should produce from one and one-half to two or three tons of hay per acre. It is cut for hay when in the soft dough stage or sometimes earlier depending upon weather conditions. Millet hay is suitable only for cows or sheep and should not be fed to horses.

Few people desire to grow hay in rows and cultivate it almost like corn yet quite a number of farmers are making plans to grow soy beans in just this way. Manchu, Mandarin and any of the other medium maturing varieties may be used for hay purposes. These are seeded in rows at 40 to 45 pounds of seed to the acre. Cultivation should be frequent enough to prevent the growth of weeds.

None of the crops mentioned are new in the Willamette valley or Washington county. They have not been grown extensively but some few farmers have experimented with them in a small way. They are not crops to be generally recommended but only as something to fill out the crop program to provide the necessary feed for livestock that must be provided for.

The Chaco

The Chaco is a vast forest region situated on the right bank of the Paraguay river between Paraguay and Bolivia. Bolivia was unfortunate enough to lose her Pacific sea coast as a result of her bad judgment in entering the war of the 80s between Peru and Chile. As a consequence the Chaco would be valuable to her since it would give her an Atlantic seaport on the Paraguay river. It is important to Paraguay for the same reason, although Paraguay already has such a seaport, being situated on the left bank of the river. It is because of its economic and commercial importance that the Chaco has become a bone of contention between the two republics. Its resources are practically untouched and it has no population to speak of.

Oyster Invasion From Japan

In Japan the art of oyster culture has been developed, it is said, way beyond any methods practiced in this country. The Japanese oysters are large and of fine quality, and they are likely to crowd out the native bivalve. In two years about 32,000 boxes of "seed" were shipped to the Pacific coast from Japan and planted. Each box contains from 5,000 to 20,000 baby oysters, and it is estimated that at least 150,000,000 "alien" oysters have been put in the waters of the west coast to compete with the native product and with native fishermen. When it is remembered that it takes only about 250 adult oysters to make a bushel, the "invasion" becomes something of a problem.

Plenty of Coal Below Ground

The United States geological survey recently estimates that this country has a remaining supply of about 3,180,000,000 net tons. These coal beds are the carbon remains of vegetation which flourished in a past geological era when climate was much milder than it now is. High temperatures and humidity in that prehistoric time permitted ferns to grow as large as trees, and plant life of many varieties was prolific. Most of the coal fields of the United States are believed known. Estimates of coal reserves are limited to those no deeper than 3,000 feet below the earth's surface. We need not worry that our coal reserves will be exhausted during our lifetimes.
