Memorial Day

Memorial Day is the date set apart each year, first by custom and later by statute, for the purpose of honoring the memory of the soldiers who fought in the Civil War.

The custom of Decoration Day, as it is otherwise called originated with the Southern States in strewing flowers over the soldier's graves. This idea was adopted by a few states in the North.

In May, 1868, Gen. John A. Logan, then commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, issued an order appointing May 30 of that year for the Grand Army services in so decorating the graves. The day possibly was chosen because it was the date of discharge of the last Union volunteer of the war. The states which observe the day have adopted it singly, there being no national law on the subject.

The spirit of the day recalls to mind the great deeds of valor and heroism performed by those whose memory we hold sacred on this day. History surely would read differently if it were not for the deeds of patriotism performed by these heroes who have gone before us. Yes, truly, they are the saviors of our country.

The spirit of the day in a wider sense, recalls the memory of all the loved ones who have passed out of our life. Father, mother, brother, sister—whoever it may be—we recall their kindness to us on this day.

We pay our respects to their graves, adorning them with flowers to show our gratitude to those loved ones who have gone before us.

Enrollment in Fourth Annual 4-H Corn Growing Contest Show Increase

The brick and tile factory of the Sylvan Brick Company, located on the old Canyon Road at Sylvan, has been recently reopened for operations on a part time basis and it is the hope of the management that, with the gradual improvement of general conditions, the output of the plant may be increased before the end of the year. Animal Characteristics Much Like Those of Men

They are easily frightened and, although their fear often leads them to attack, it is a sort of desperation because of their nervousness and thoughtlessness. Lions are given to terrible bursts of fury, but it requires more time and cause to start a lion than a leopard. Lions think over a situation before plunging. Leopards fight at the drop of a hat—or less.

Cheetahs, although not strictly members of the cat family, exhibit the temperamental qualities of both the lion and leopard. They are very nervous, but at times have a calmness and repose suggestive of lions. When tamed and accustomed to humans, cheetahs can be affectionate and docile. This is a trait of the lion.

Refers to Counting Time

The word "ides" refers to the Roman system of reckoning time. The Romans divided their month into Kalends, Nones and Ides. The Kalends came on the first of the month. In March, May and October the Nones fell on the 7th and the Ides on the 15th. In the remaining months the Nones came on the 5th and the Ides on the 13th. The "Ides of March," therefore, was the period from the 15th to the 1st of the following month.

Sylvan Brick Company Factory Reopens for Active Business

A 50% increase in the number of 4-H club members enrolled in the 4th annual corn growing contest sponsored by the Commercial-National Bank of Hillsboro is evidence of the growing interest in 4-H work in Washington county. 54 club members have entered this contest as compared to 36 enrolled last year, according to Joseph Belanger, assistant county agent.

The Commercial National Bank in starting this annual contest three years ago, had as one aim the improvement in quality of field corn in the county. Minnesota 13 was selected as the variety having the widest adaptation and this variety has been the only variety entered in the contest. Over a ton of seed has been sold by the 4-H club members this spring for an average of 5c a pound. Seed dealers have paid a premium this spring for corn grown by club members.

The bank awards \$60 in prizes each fall for the best exhibits at the bank show. First prize is a scholarship to the 4-H club summer school at Corvallis plus \$5 to defray transportation and incidental expenses. This was won last fall by Joe Berger, Beaverton, Rt. 1. Second place is \$10, third is \$5 and fourth to eleventh places are \$3 each with \$1 awarded for twelfth place.

Men leading corn clubs this year are Harry Hansen, Portland, Rt 2; John Gates, Hillsboro, Rt 3; Floyd Blerly, Beaverton, Rt 3; Bruce Chalmers, Cornelius, Rt. 1; Albert Jensen, Forest Grove, Rt 2; Martin Herb, Banks, Rt 1; and Adrian Hornecker, Hillsboro, Rt 5. In addition several boys are in corn club work as individuals.
