The new charter has been needed for many years to expedite the best interests of Beaverton and will soon be ready for the printer. Attorney Reimer is to be commended for his tireless efforts in drawing up a document which is a masterpiece that will safeguard the future destinies of our city.

Interesting Talk Heard On Kennels club Races

Fawn Warrior, a red fawn dog, owned by Mr. Lucas carried off first place honors in the inaugural handicap of the Multnomah Kennel's club racing season Thursday night on the Civic stadium track. The beautiful cup awarded him has been on display at the Greyhound Coffee Shop the past week. Mr. Lucas, who has rented a farm on the Farmington road, says at one time he was offered \$5000 for his dog but refused and his judgment proved good as his racing dog is a valuable one.

O. R. Wohlauf gave an interesting talk before the Kiwanis club, Wednesday, on the Multnomah Kennels club races being held at the Multnomah stadium in Portland. He stated there are 360 dogs in the races, with 35 owners, most of whom are residing in or near Beaverton. Regulations call for a dog at least 15 months old, weighing 60 pounds or more. Teams of dogs in the races are made up of those about the same weight, but, like horses, sometimes the owners are surprised at the ability of these animals.

Each dog is weighed in every night at 5 p. m. and placed in kennels, according to their weight, no one is allowed to view them but their owners.

Many are curious as to why the animals are kept muzzled, as they are not ugly. This is done for the sole purpose of protecting other animals, such as cats, pets, etc., should the dog break away from their owners.

The dogs are carried to and from the racing field in large wagons, the most valuable being transported by their owners in private sedans.

One is able to remember back when young the saying "Hark! Hark! The dogs do bark, the beggars are coming to town" now, especially in Beaverton, it is "Hark! Hark! The dogs are coming to town, some in trucks, some in big sedans." The animals are gentle and have never been known to attack children. They have proven to be much better racers than the whippets.

Racing of this type is going on in California, New York, Chicago, Indiana and Salt Lake City.

ROSE FESTIVAL TO BE FORMALLY OPENED NEXT THURSDAY

Willamette to be Scene of Water Pageant and Fireworks

The stage is all set for the Silver Jubilee Rose Festival, June 8 to 11. During these four days Portland will lose its identity as a great commercial city to become the fairyland of flowers and merrymaking.

The Festival formally will be opened with the opening of the annual Rose Show of the Portland Rose Society in civic auditorium, at 1 p. m., June 8. At 2 p. m. in a gorgeous setting in Multnomah Stadium, Queen Jean will be crowned, and while surrounded by her brilliant court a beautiful and spectacular program will be presented.

The grand floral parade, climaxing feature of the annual fete, headed by Queen Jean and her royal court, will be held at 3 p. m. on the afternoon of June 9. This parade, the last word in floral pageantry, will be miles long with many gorgeously decorated floats, uniformed marching organizations and bands and drums and bugle corps.

A brilliantly illuminated water pageant and fireworks will be held on the Willamette, Saturday night, June 10, in which there will be many gaily decorated water craft competing for honors. Many special stunts will be staged in connection with this feature, including life-saving and surfboard and water-ski riding. The fireworks display will be spectacular.

The festival will close at 4 p. m., Sunday, June 11, with vesper services in rose bowl, Washington Park, in which massed choirs of Portland's churches, will give a program of song and pageantry in exaltation of the rose.

Each day during the festival there will be three performances of the outdoor production of "Alice in Wonderland," in Festival Center, a fly-casting tournament on Laurelhurst park lake at 3 p. m., Thursday, June 8, and a handicap motorboat race on the Willamette starting at noon, June 11.

A fleet of four United States destroyers from the Pacific scouting fleet will be in the harbor during the festival and they will be open to visitors from 1 to 5 o'clock each day.

Queen Jeans name will live longer than the Silver Jubilee Rose Festival Her memory will be perpetuated in a beautiful rose for one of the most beautiful of the unnamed roses in the international rose test garden in Washington is to be christened in her honor. The christening of the rose will take place at the Rosarian knight ceremonial in civic auditorium.

To all festival attractions, wearers of festival buttons will be admitted without charge.
